

Japs Butcher Thousands During Orgy Of Blood

MANILA, Oct. 31 (AP)—Mariano Del Rosario, Manila city undertaker, took the stand against Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita today and testified that victims of the erstwhile "Tiger of Malaya's" troops during their orgy of blood last February mounted to the thousands.

Other witnesses already had told in incident after incident how the Japanese troops, when it was certain they could no longer hold the city, had run wild, slaughtering men, women and children alike.

From February 3 to the end of March, Del Rosario testified, he and his burial crews collected and buried more than 8000 victims, some of them badly mutilated.

The defense questioned Del Rosario's figures and asked for proof of the number buried.

The witness strongly asserted his records were correct and added:

"I billed the government of the United States for 120,000 pesos—and I am still not paid."

The comment was permitted to remain in the records.

Massacre
The largest incident of the day's presentation of six cases of atrocity was the massacre of St. Paul's college on Feb. 9, where nearly 1000 civilians were wounded or killed.

Luisa Borohana, 30-year-old Spanish girl, testified how "the Japanese forced us all into the dining hall, where all the windows were closed."

"I noticed huge black balls hanging from the center of the ceiling. I thought they were blackout lights."

"Then the Japanese brought in candy and drinks and placed them in the center of the room. When the people rushed up to the center there were great explosions from the black balls, killing and wounding many."

Then, she said, Japanese opened the doors and began firing and throwing grenades among the panic-stricken survivors.

Sister Anna de Jesus said the explosion blew the dining hall roof more than three blocks and left the ancient college a mass of wreckage.

"Treasure Hunt"
In Alabama, where students accounted for 38 per cent of the state's E-bond quota, during the Seventh War Loan drive, schools will close November 15 for a "treasure hunt" to fill up war stamp books.

RUSS EXPECTED TO TAKE PART IN MEET

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—President Truman said today he expects Russia to participate soon in the far eastern advisory commission meeting here to consider Japanese control policy.

The president told a news conference he also had received a very satisfactory reply from Generalissimo Stalin to the letter which American Ambassador Harriman recently delivered to Stalin at his vacation retreat in the Crimea.

He did not disclose the contents of the reply.

Failure of Russia so far to send a representative to the far eastern meeting here had constituted a stumbling block in American-Soviet relations. The participating governments met for the first time yesterday, but adjourned immediately for a week evidently to give Russia further opportunity to come in on the sessions.

President Truman said the reply he had received from Stalin reached him last Saturday when he was visiting New York on Navy Day. He said there were certain reasons the reply could not be made public now.

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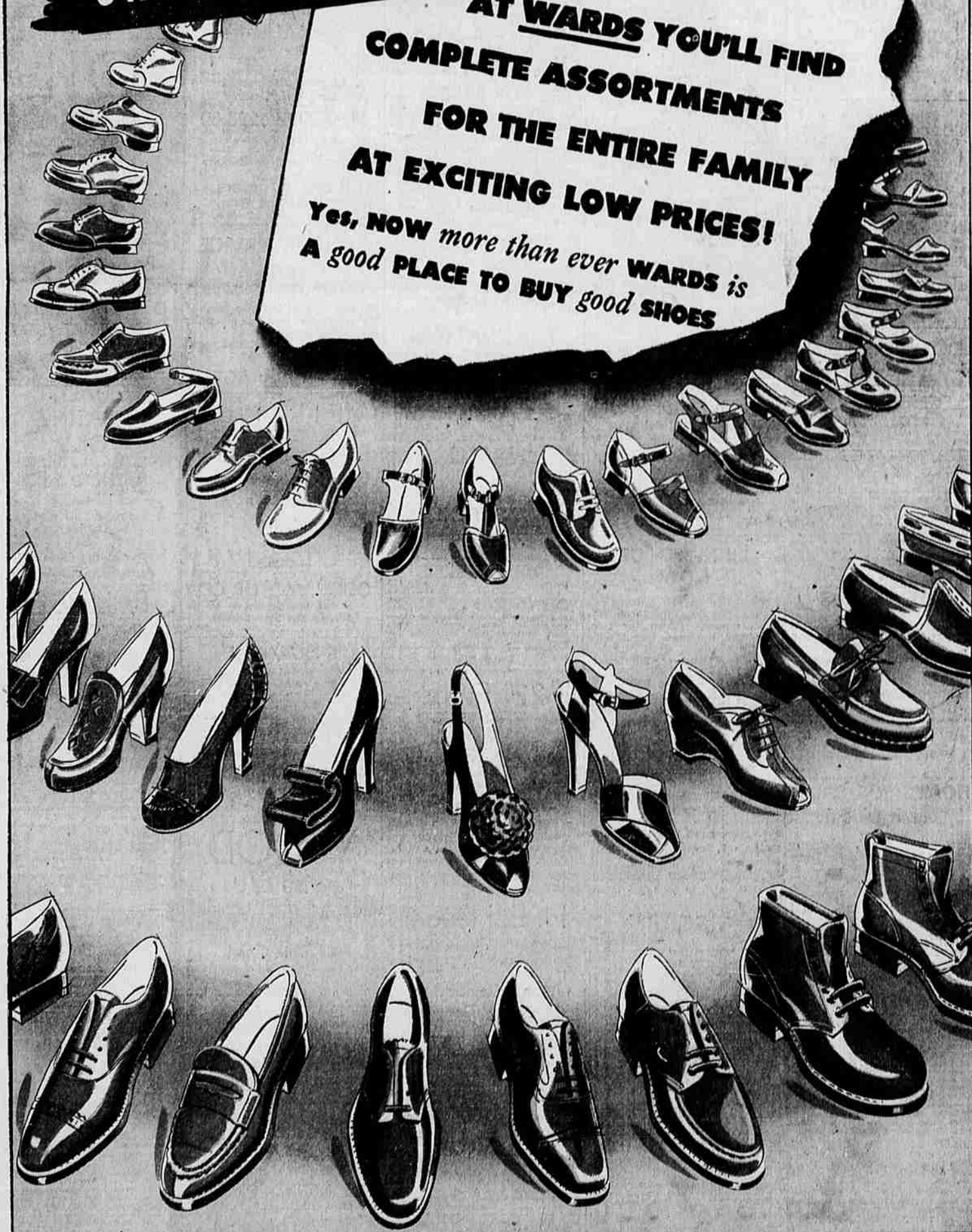
