

IKE REPORTS UNREST AMONG GERMAN PEOPLE

(Continued from Page One) persons. While there has been some improvement in dealing with this lawlessness, "cases of murder and organized looting have occurred at an unpleasant rate."

Resentment over depredations already has led to some trouble, the report disclosed. In Bremen, 20 German youths 16 to 23 years were arrested because they could carry out a planned attack against displaced persons.

Approximately 22,000 German civilian police were on duty in the American zone at the end of September, but only in the Bremen area were they permitted to carry arms.

Firearms Uncovered
Security raids on displaced persons camps invariably have uncovered some firearms and explosives, the report added.

Holding out some hope for an improvement in the general situation, the report said:

"It is estimated that 80 to 70 per cent of the 250,000 Polish displaced persons now in the United States zone, and who constitute the greatest source of disorder and lawlessness, will be repatriated voluntarily by December 1, 1945."

The Eisenhower report said plans had been discovered for attacks of German youths on displaced persons in upper Bavaria and other places.

"Displaced persons continue the chief source of unrest and lawlessness," the report said. "Cases of murder and organized looting have occurred at an unpleasant rate."

The military government in Aschaffenburg in the district of Bavaria was quoted as reporting: "Livestock is being depleted through robberies. Laborers in surrounding areas refuse to leave their homes because of fear of being attacked and having their bicycles stolen. Farmers hesitate to work in fields, because of fear of being attacked by marauding bands."

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RFC To Make Loans To Aid Reconversion

SALEM, Oct. 31 (AP)—The reconstruction finance corporation is preparing to make loans to cities and towns to help in reconversion, the state postwar commission was advised today.

John W. Kelly, state postwar director, said this is the first such offer to be made by the government. The RFC would accept revenue bonds and other securities.

Eligible for loans will be municipal water systems, sewers, sewage disposal plants, airports, tunnels, bridges, roads, hospitals, public buildings, schools, colleges, dormitories, stadiums, docks and harbor facilities.

TOURIST SEASON AT CRATER LAKE FAIR

A fair tourist season was reported at Crater Lake National park this year, by Thomas C. Parker, assistant superintendent.

Parker said, despite lack of help and war conditions, it was "really a good year." After gas rationing was lifted, tourists poured into the park in almost pre-war numbers.

Park officials are ready and willing to open the park for the winter, he said, if finances should be made available. A Snowcat tractor has been ordered from the inventor and is under construction now. Delivery is expected in a few weeks.

This snow tractor will be used for making frequent checking trips into the park this winter. The park and all roads through the park are definitely closed now for the season, due to the early snowfall.

British General Killed By Natives At Big Naval Base

and directed by Japanese officers and Germans who were former U-boat captains and crews."

They heavily outnumbered the 1600 British troops, Christians said, and were armed with weapons secured because of what he described as an unauthorized surrender by a Japanese general, Nakamura, to Dutch Capt. P. J. G. Huyser, in defiance of written British orders, Christians said only China, Russia, Britain and the United States were authorized to receive Japanese surrenders.

As the result of that surrender, Christians said, "there were in Soerabaja large quantities of arms, ammunition, armored cars and tanks which the Japanese had surrendered to Huyser."

On October 28, the allied commander told a press conference, "a treacherous and unprovoked attack was made on British and Indian forces at Soerabaja after the occupation had been proceeding there three days in a friendly and cooperative manner."

there to fight to the death," he declared. Yen said the attack on Tatung was being led by Ho Lung, whom he described as one of the best communist generals.

Dispersed
Shansi provincial troops were too dispersed, Yen said, to come to the relief of Tatung, "and we must rely on the central government for reinforcements."

A communist spokesman said Yen's accusation that tanks manned by men dressed like Outer Mongols were participating in the attack on Tatung was "Kuomintang propaganda trying to imply that we are getting Russian support so that Chiang Kai-shek can appeal for American help."

The spokesman added that communists had learned that Chiang was planning to send some of his crack troops to Shansi and Suiyuan provinces "very soon."

Reported Missing

New Record Set For Cows On Test

PULLMAN, Oct. 31 (AP)—Washington State has attained the highest state record ever made for cows on test for any state where more than 350 have been on test, M. B. Nichols, state dairy extension specialist, said today.

Nichols said 16,000 cows on test in Washington are averaging 360 pounds of butterfat yearly, as contrasted with an average production of 240 pounds for all cows within the state, and 180 pounds for all cows in the United States.

count in passing upon applications for price ceiling increases." The president made these other points:

1. The labor-management conference convening next Monday is to "recommend machinery for mediating or arbitrating differences whenever collective bargaining fails to work."

2. Recent labor difficulties "stand in the way of reconversion" and reemployment of veterans and war workers. "We need more of the good sense, the reasonableness, the consideration for the position of the other fellow, the teamwork which we had during the war."

3. Congress has bottled up liberalized unemployment compensation and "full employment" legislation which Mr. Truman regards as vital.

4. To grant industry price relief to match every wage increase would bring on inflation. "While the positions of different industries vary greatly, there is room in the existing price structure for business as a whole to grant increases in wage rates."

The president made liberal use of a confidential report of reconversion economists which, though not made public, had "leaked" to some Washington newspapermen. He did not, however, mention the report's finding that 24 per cent wage increase could be allowed generally on the basis of measurable business factors.

Wage Disputes
Yesterday the CIO Packing House Workers union asked for a strike vote among 200,000 production workers seeking a 25 cents an hour wage hike. A majority of the current labor disputes are over wages.

In the San Francisco bay area today, the strike of some 10,000 AFL and CIO machinists for the second day kept idle about 40,000 other workers in 200 industrial plants. An AFL spokesman expressed hope for a "break" in the stoppage today as federal conciliators met with management and labor in an effort to end the walkout.

Huyser, "as a result of which there were left in Soerabaja large quantities of arms, ammunition, armored cars and tanks which the Japs had surrendered to Huyser."

It's a complicated story, but the general drift of it is that these "nationalists" who are stirring up the trouble in Java have been and are being egged on by Japs and Germans—who are possibly adventurers on the loose, raising all the Cain they can.

IN explosive north China General Yen Hsi-shan, Chungking governor of Shansi province, says today that 100,000 Chinese communists are attacking the town of Tatung which is defended by only 10,000 Chungking troops, who are without tanks and have only 10 field guns whereas the attackers "who are dressed like Outer Mongolians" (Russian influence) have 40 or more field guns and 15 to 20 tanks.

A communist spokesman retorts that through Yen's accusation the "Kuomintang (Chungking central government) is trying to imply that we are getting Russian support so that Chiang Kai-shek can appeal for AMERICAN help."

It could be. The Chinese factions will drag us and the Russians into it if they can.

PRESIDENT TRUMAN implies again that BIG negotiations are on with Stalin. He says that as yet he can't disclose their subject—which is probably true, as the Russians invariably demand strict secrecy in such affairs. But we can guess that this dangerous Chinese situation enters into the negotiations in some manner or other.

We can only hope that we and the Russians can come to some amicable agreement on this business. NOTHING could be more TRAGIC than getting the U. S. and Russia into a fight over this developing Chinese civil war.
