

Free Press Advocates Insist On Requirement In Appropriation Bill

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—The house faced a showdown today over inclusion of a "free press" requirement in a \$550,000,000 appropriation bill.

HOUSE ASKED TO INCREASE FARM PRICES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Farm state representatives tied a demand for increased agricultural prices today to President Truman's call for a boost in labor's wages.

Led by Rep. Pace (D-Ga.), they sought to rewrite the farm parity formula so as to include the cost of farm labor in the "fair price" computation.

Parity is deemed to be a farm commodity price which will give farmers a purchasing power equivalent to a former favorable period, equally 1909-1914.

Pace told reporters it is necessary to maintain the purchasing power of the farmer as that of the laborer.

Hike Parity Prices
The formula revision, agriculture experts said, would boost many parity prices by approximately 31 per cent. For example the government under present conditions would consider 28.4 cents a pound a "fair price" for cotton instead of the present 21.7 cents parity level; \$2.02 a bushel for wheat instead of \$1.55, and \$1.47 a bushel for corn instead of \$1.12.

The house has approved the parity change twice in recent years but the senate has not gone along.

With the unanimous approval of the house agriculture committee, Pace expected to present the legislation to the house in a formal report again today. He said he did not know when the house will call it up for a vote.

Withheld Relief
In its original form, the amendment would have withheld relief from any country not recognizing complete freedom of the press as it is understood in this country.

Brown modified it to apply only to reporting of UNRRA activities when it became apparent that a broader restriction might be ruled out of order on a technicality.

The amended proposal has supporters and opponents in both democratic and republican ranks. The republican steering committee, shaper of party policy in the house, has endorsed its principle.

When the controversy is settled, perhaps late today, the bill goes to the senate. An indication of the closeness of the fight was given Tuesday when the appropriations committee rejected a similar proposal, 16 to 15.

No Valid Objection
Brown and his supporters argued at length yesterday that there could be no valid objection to permitting free reporting of how United States dollars are being spent for foreign relief.

They pointed out that the new fund would boost to \$1,350,000,000 this country's contribution to the 45-nation relief undertaking in liberated countries, making it by far the largest donor.

Opponents insisted the effect of the proposal is to declare that the United States will not help feed starving children and women unless their governments give a free rein to American newsmen.

In some countries, they argued, the people who need food and clothing have little or nothing to say about government policies. Others "controlled by Russia," said Rep. McMillen (R-Ill.), "will not be permitted to make such an agreement."

Government Seeks Public Ownership Of Telecommunications

LONDON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton said in commons today the labor government had decided to press for public ownership of telecommunications services now operated by Cable and Wireless, Ltd.

Dalton said legislation for that purpose would be introduced "in due course."

The announcement came as the first official notice that the government was planning to extend its nationalization program beyond that announced in its campaign platform.

The platform called for public ownership of the Bank of England, inland transportation, public utilities and heavy industry.

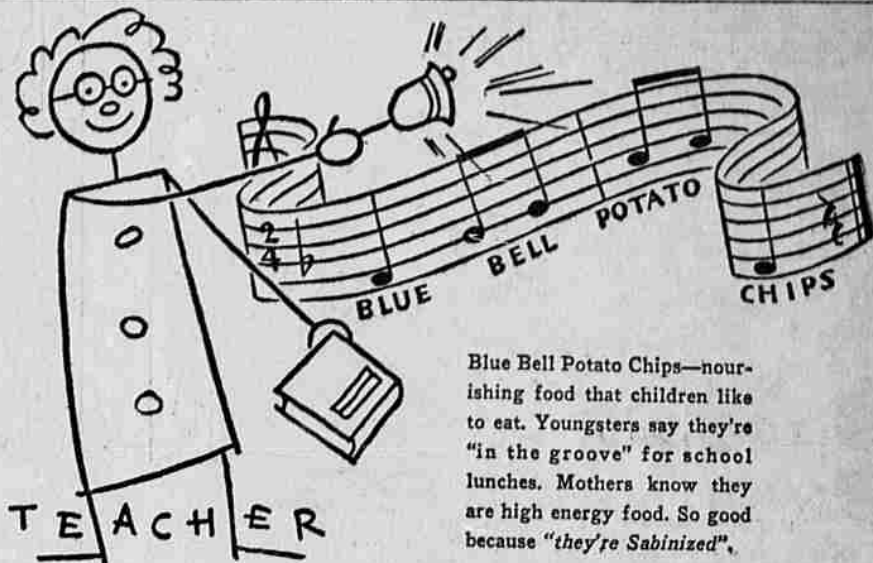
