# Early Pioneer Of Klamath County Passes Away Here

In the passing of John D. Hooper, 81, on October 30 at Hillside hospital, the Klamath Falls community lost one of its early pioneers and much loved citizens.

In 1905, year of the San Francisco quake and fire, Mr. and Mrs. Hooper and two children, William and Austin, came to Oregon. Because of an overcrowded stage filled with emigrants going north from the stricken Bay cities, it became necessary for Mr. Hooper to walk and Al Leavitt, early Klamath Falls attorney and circuit judge, to ride atop the vehicle from Pogeama near Hornbrook, the terminus of the railroad, to give place for Mrs. Hooper and the children. The course of the stage followed up the Klamath river to the site of what was then known as the town of Linkville.

John D. Hooper was born October 6, 1864 at Robinsville, N. C. where he spent his early boyhood. At 21 he married Saily Ann Cook of Ashville, N. C., with whom he lived for over 56 years. She died in Ashland, Ore., September 6, 1942.

In his late twenties, the family moved to Tennessee for three years' residence, thence to Oklahoma to what was then Indian territory, and then to Oregon to the present 1300-acre farm of the Miller Island community, now operated by two sons, Bernard and John.

**Became Legend**  
Mr. Hooper became a legend for strength and fleetness of foot, and was the common subject of comment for his prowess. For 40 years he worked successfully on his Oregon farm raising grain and stock. His hobby was horses. He was often seen, in advanced age, attired in characteristic leather habits in Fourth of July parades, riding his favorite mount Dan.

Life was for Mr. Hooper a happy experience. He sincerely loved his neighbors; his joy was little children. He was loved by all. He loved his God, and was a faithful member of the Church of the Nazarene.

Never having suffered ill

health until about two months ago, he was stricken and passed away at the advanced age of 81 years and 24 days. He leaves to survive him four daughters, Mrs. Harry Baum of Klamath Falls, Mrs. Stella Kemp of Portland, Mrs. John Scott of Delavan, Calif., and Mrs. Opal McCormack of Honolulu, Hawaii; four sons, W. P. Hooper of Tulac, Calif., J. C. Mox, and Bernard Hooper of Midland; 14 grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

Funeral services will be held at Ward's Funeral Home chapel, Friday, November 2 at 2:30 p. m. Committal services and interment will be in the family plot in Linkville cemetery.
