4 PERSONS KILLED IN NEW DISORDERS

By GEORGE PALMER JERUSALEM, Nov. 1 (AP)—Four persons were killed and at least 10 injured as Jewish-Arab political differences led to a new outbreak of disorders today during which systematic attacks were made on railway communications throughout Palestine.

British military headquarters announced that Palestine rail lines were cut in about 50 places.

A British military communiqué attributed the attacks to Jews. Blame was not immediately attached to any specific group, but an exhaustive police and military investigation was underway all over Palestine.

Police captured five armed Jews following the holdup of a train between Jerusalem and Lydda.

Police launches in Haifa and Jaffa harbors blew up from mines at 2 a. m. One sank and two others were seriously damaged.

A mysterious explosion which rocked Jerusalem shortly before midnight was believed to have been the result of an attack upon the railroad.

British military sources said casualties included one British soldier killed and another wounded; one Palestine policeman killed, and one wounded; two Palestine railway workers killed, and six others wounded, one of them critically.
