

Witnesses Scream For Death Of Malaya Tiger

MANILA, Nov. 2 (AP)—Chinese, Filipino and Spanish witnesses who hysterically cursed the Japanese and screamed for the death of Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, threw the war criminal trial of the former Philippine commander-in-chief in continual turmoil today.

Members of the prosecution staff and interpreters both were required to quiet a Chinese woman whose four-year-old son had been snatched from her arms and repeatedly bayoneted.

The woman testified she has lost nine of the 12 in her family, had seen women and children slain and raped when 39 Chinese were herded into a lumberyard and murdered last February 10. "I'd like to kill that Japanese man," she screamed in Chinese

at Yamashita as she finished her testimony and leaped to her feet. "That Jap is to blame for everything. He's got to be killed to pay for what he's done."

Bestial Scenes
Scenes "so bestial it is hard to find words to describe them," were related by witnesses of the mass slaying of from 500 to 1000 civilians who had taken refuge in the Manila German club on the same day.

Spanish Francisco Lopez, former Metro-Goldwyn Mayer representative in the Philippines, shouted that all Japanese soldiers were "sadists and beasts" as he testified that Yamashita's troops poured gasoline over women's heads and set them afire, made sport of young girls for the entertainment of other Japanese at a club and then

raped one of the girls after she was dead.

Another Spaniard, Jose Maldonado, described the tossing of a hand grenade into a bathroom where the Japanese had locked up all the men of a group of 50 who sought refuge in a certain home. Five were killed and many maimed.

He said his wife, 22-year-old Maria, was stabbed in the back with a bayonet and the point stuck out two inches from her chest.

An elderly Spaniard glared hard at Yamashita as he told of being wounded in the bathroom and then stumbling out into the kitchen where he found three women who had been misused by the Japanese and then slain.

A pretty 21-year-old Filipino girl, who exhibited a horribly scarred leg, testified how she and some 50 others had been shut in a walled yard, the entrances set afire and grenades thrown at them. She escaped by running through the flames.

Details of the slaying of Albert C. Delfino, Venezuelan consul, his wife and foster son, on February 13 were related by a witness who said they and six others were tied, marched into a room of their home and shot. The house was burned. The victims were all robbed before they were slain, the witness said.

A guard at the home of Carlos Perez Rubio, well known Philippine business man who was killed as the Japanese fired his home, said Rubio was shot five times as he attempted to escape.

A nurse who had attended Brig. Gen. Carl Mathorst, retired officer of the Philippine constabulary, said she last saw the aged general and his wife and daughter among those who were trapped in the German club. She did not know their fate, but has not seen them since.

BERTHING PORTS FOR SHIPS CHOSEN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Berthing ports for 2080 ships of the fleet to be kept in inactive status were announced today by the navy.

Assignments were by categories of ships and represented space available, the navy said, but specific assignments of ships by name have not yet been made.

Of the total, 1007 will be berthed in east coast areas, 924 on the west coast, and 149 in the gulf.

The navy said five other berthing areas are under study for accommodation of other ships if needed.

TRUMAN WANTS CIVIL SERVICE WAGE INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—A senate committee was advised today that President Truman wants the pay of federal civil service workers raised a straight 20 per cent.

He also wants the pay of congressmen boosted to \$20,000 a year and the salaries of cabinet members to \$25,000. Congressmen now receive \$10,000 and cabinet members \$15,000.

Arthur S. Fleming, of the civil service commission, told the civil service committee that he was "authorized to state" that such increases would be in conformity with the program of the president.

Fleming said the president's program also included:

1. An increase in the salary ceiling for professional, scientific and administrative jobs under civil service from \$9800 to \$15,000.
2. Salaries for heads of executive departments (cabinet members) at the rate of \$25,000, for under secretaries and solicitors general \$20,000; assistant secretaries and assistant attorney generals, \$17,500, and heads of independent agencies and

boards, \$17,500 or \$20,000 as determined by the president.

3. Salaries of \$25,000 for the vice president and the speaker of the house, and \$20,000 for members of congress. Mr. Truman previously had recommended the increase for congressmen.

4. Increases in the judiciary to \$30,500 for the chief justice of the United States, \$30,000 for associate justices of the supreme court, \$22,500 for judges of the circuit courts of appeals and of the court of claims,

\$20,500 for the chief justice of the District of Columbia U. S. district court and \$20,000 for district court and \$20,000 for This would represent generally a \$10,000 a year increase all down the line in federal judicial posts.

The vice president and the speaker of the house now receive \$15,000.

CAUSE OF BOY'S DEATH UNKNOWN

ELLENSBURG, Wash., Nov. 2 (AP)—Authorities were unable to establish the cause of fatal injuries to Vernon Lee Gates, 16, found on a street in Kittitas.

The boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Gates of Kittitas, was riding alone in the rear of a pickup truck, according to State Patrol Sgt. Arthur Baker. He said occupants of the truck's cab reported Gates lost his hat and that they had turned around to return for it when they noticed the boy was no longer in the truck.

Baker said Gates was found by occupants of another car with his head and right side crushed—injuries which could not have come from a fall from the truck.
