

CIO TEXTILE WORKERS QUIT; 266,000 IDLE

type of work performed. They have asked for a raise of 10 cents an hour. Eight mills in Connecticut employing 2500 and two mills in New Hampshire employing 4000 struck in a dispute over demands for a closed or union shop. No wage issue was involved in their demands.

No Settlement

There was little indication of a settlement of the strike of AFL and CIO machinists in the San Francisco Bay area as an additional 5000 workers were made idle because of shutdown of industries. Some 60,000 workers in about 200 plants are affected by the walkout, which started last Monday over demands for a 30 per cent wage increase for the machinists.

Retail store milk supplies were reported "dripping" because of the closing of a carton producing plant. A union spokesman said reports of carton shortage had been exaggerated but milk industry spokesmen denied there was an adequate backlog.

Service on six Greyhound bus lines operating east of the Mississippi to the Atlantic seaboard remained halted for the second day by a strike of some 4000 AFL employees who left their jobs over a dispute on wages.

In New York, George E. Sift, president of Local 1202, Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees, said if a settlement was not reached "soon," the strike "may spread through out the country." Thousands of bus passengers were inconvenienced by the disruption of service.

Food Stores Close

In Salt Lake City, 60 of the major food stores were closed in a controversy over wages between management and 400 AFL meat cutters and food handlers. They quit work Thursday after the union said disagreement on wage scales prevented the signing of a new contract. They are seeking \$55 for 48 hours for journeymen meatcutters compared to current scales of \$50.40 for 54 hours.

The employers' committee maintained that its offer of \$52.50 for 48 hours exceeded the cost of living increases. There appeared little hope for an early break in the deadlock.

A walkout of 140 independent union workers at the Graphite Bronze Co. in Cleveland kept 1,500 from work. Spokesmen of the Mechanics Educational Society of America independent union said the strikers had been demoted without a shop committee being consulted, while the company said the walkout was in violation of a contract.

ton to appear for the Klamath Indians before congressional committees and otherwise express their wishes there.

Jackson and Crawford, the elected delegates, have indicated in recent statements they do not see eye to eye on pending legislation and other matters affecting the Klamath Indians. Jackson signed a press statement criticizing Crawford and doubting the possibility of passage of the Crawford sponsored bill, SB1313. This bill would provide for eventual liquidation of reservation property and conferment of full citizenship on the Indians.

Jackson indicated he favors the Indian welfare bill, which would provide for \$1000 payments to each enrolled member of the Klamath tribes out of money credited to the Indians in the government treasury.

Wade Crawford submitted the following statement of appreciation to The Herald and News today:

"To the Klamath Indians who gave me their loyal support to represent them as their delegate in Washington, D. C., I express to you my heartfelt thanks for the courage our God gave you to vote your honest conviction. In return I now assure you that you shall always find me in the ranks of those who fight for the uplift and betterment of our race, the American Indian."

own pay it can't very well refuse to increase OTHER PEOPLE'S pay.

THIS writer, after considerable observation in recent years, sincerely believes that congressmen are UNDERPAID. If they do a thoroughly good job for their constituents, they simply can't live on their salaries.

Being a congressman or a senator is an EXPENSIVE job—you can't realize how expensive it is unless you've seen it in operation.

BUT if congress takes NOW the bait the President is offering, it will wind up with its tail caught tightly in a trap. If it votes to double its own pay and then refuses to raise other people's pay it will find itself in bad trouble.

THE world news is TEMPORARILY a little less menacing this morning. U. S. ships are hauling Chungking Chinese troops into Manchuria, to take the place of Russian garrison troops that are moving out. The Chinese communists obviously don't like it, and are muttering in their beards.

They threaten to fire on any Chungking Chinese troops landed from U. S. vessels in "liberated" areas—by which they mean, apparently, purely Chinese areas "liberated" by the communists from Jap rule. The catch seems to be that Manchuria isn't a purely Chinese area, having been stolen by Japan some time ago.

It is pure speculation, but it LOOKS as if we have some sort of understanding with the Russians—at least in regard to Manchuria. Otherwise we would certainly not be taking the risk involved in hauling in Chungking Chinese to take the place of the red troops that are moving out.

THE British are SITTING ON THE LID in Java, and the situation there seems to be improving a little. The shooting is diminishing, and the factions are beginning to TALK around a table. British psychological warfare experts offer some pious advice to both sides today in a broadcast over the Bataavia radio in which they stress that "the battlefield of democracy is the council table."

Java illustrates the great importance of sitting on the lid, if possible, until the hatreds and the personal ambitions that flare up in the wake of a great war have time to cool a little.

Previously one of the company's principal officials had told the Associated Press the Iwasakis had no retirement plans.

Leading officials of Yasuda and Sumitomo—two others of the big four family combines—already had resigned and Mitsui has announced the prospective retirement of members of 10 Mitsui families, including Baron Takakimi Mitsui, president of the Mitsui Holding company.

It is understood that American authorities are concentrating upon these combines as the major oldline Zaibatsu and that less pressure has been applied to Okura, considered the fifth ranking family monopoly.

The Iwasakis also resigned positions in numerous Mitsubishi subsidiaries. The newspaper Asahi reported that Ryozo Tanaka, former president of Mitsubishi Trading company, was named president of the holding company. Harunosuke Suzuki retains his position as the principal managing director.

committee not to underestimate the magnitude of the authority question.

Sawyer spoke particularly on the proposed Columbia valley authority, which would cover not only the Columbia watershed but those parts of Oregon—including the Klamath basin—outside the actual watershed.

The Bend publisher denied that experience with the Tennessee valley authority—the only operating authority—proves the need and value of the proposed Columbia valley authority. He quoted various authorities to the effect that TVA is not the success some have painted it.

He discussed at length the broad powers conferred on the authority board in the CVA bill. Sawyer said that among other broad grants, the proposed bill in itself authorizes appropriations, making the authority financially independent without the customary requirement of returning to the "people in congress assembled" for appropriations.

The speaker urged a searching public interest in the authority proposals.

His extraordinary heroism, outstanding perseverance and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States naval service."

CHINESE LAND AT TWO PORTS IN MANCHURIA

troops, of the 13th, 16th and 94th Chinese armies, were taken to Manchuria in U. S. transports from Shanghai, Indo-China, and Hong Kong.

The government soldiers will be moved north in strength this month to permit complete withdrawal of the Russians by Dec. 1, said a semi-official dispatch from Tientsin.

Meanwhile, as scattered fighting occurred in 11 northern provinces of China, a central government cabinet spokesman charged anew that the Chinese communists had threatened to fire on any government soldiers landed from U. S. ships in communist "liberated areas." He said the communists issued the warning during peace negotiations in Chungking.

After the first such charge, it was denied by one of the leading communist negotiators, Gen. Chou En-lai.

Collaboration Charged
A communist statement today charged that Gen. Yen Hsi-shan, governor of Shansi province who is visiting in Chungking, collaborated with the Japanese both during and after the war.

The statement accused him during the war of receiving Japanese military representatives to discuss cooperation against the communists. It also alleged that after Japan's surrender a joint force of Yen's troops and the Japanese used poison gas in compelling the communists to lift the siege against four towns and to abandon two others in Shansi.

The communists demanded that the government dismiss and punish General Yen.

sidering a senate-passed bill on the subject for nearly six weeks. The two leaders had varying opinions however about prospects of the unemployment compensation measure before the ways and means committee.

McCormack said he is still hopeful for favorable action soon. He said he believed "some republicans on the committee will see the light." Ten democrats voted for consideration of the legislation recently, with ten republicans and four democrats opposed.

Expresses Doubts
Ramspeck declared he doubted the committee would change its position unless members became convinced through messages from voters that the public wants it to do so.

The jobless pay bill which Mr. Truman has requested would provide unemployment benefits up to a maximum of \$25 weekly for 26 weeks.

The "full employment" measure would enunciate a government policy of supplementing private industry, when necessary, with enough works projects to assure job opportunities for all Americans able and willing to work.

tlement, which may set a pattern for the strike-stymied lumber industry.

Negotiations between the striking AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers and one group of operators—the plywood and door manufacturers' industrial relations committee—opened this afternoon.

The AFL, whose strike is entering its 40th day, is demanding a \$1.10 hourly minimum and a 20-cent across-the-board boost. The non-striking CIO was asking \$1.15—with a 25-cent across-the-board boost.

The agreement made today, applying only to the single group of fir operators with CIO employees, is the first settlement of any kind reached in postwar wage negotiations in the northwest lumber industry.
