

# STARK URGES SCIENCE STUDY CRATER LAKE

Klamath Chamber Manager Charles R. Stark today proposed that Crater lake park roads be kept open this winter for possible use of scientists in observing phenomena that may foreshadow volcanic activity at the famed Klamath county lake.

Copies of the following telegram have been sent to U. S. Sen. Guy Cordon and Congressman Lowell Stockman.

"Geological disturbances at Crater Lake reported by four separate reliable groups or individuals, since September 1, may foreshadow renewed volcanic action. In interest of science suggest installing instruments for measuring and recording geological disturbances and keeping park roads open for quick access of scientists."

The two wires were sent, following reports of unusual phenomena, witnessed at Crater Lake since September 1. Mysterious clouds of gas or smoke arising from the lake have been reported, as well as masses of muddy rubble appearing near the surface of the water. These reports came from four separate sources.

## Weather Reported Variable In October

October's bright blue weather prevailed for just 11 days this fall, according to records from the local office of U. S. bureau of reclamation, for the Klamath basin.

There were 11 partly cloudy days, and nine cloudy days in October, 1945.

Total precipitation for October, 1945, was 1.62 inches. Normal for the month over a 52-week period is .99 inches. Total last year was .73 for the month and in 1943 it was 1.31 inches. Heaviest rainfall for the month occurred October 30 when .63 of an inch was recorded. On this same day light snowfall at the Marine Barracks was reported by post personnel.

The mean monthly temperature was 53.1 degrees, while normal was 49.7 degrees. Maximum temperature occurred October 2, when the mercury registered 84 degrees. Minimum of 23 degrees was recorded October 24. There were eight days during the month when the minimum temperature dropped to freezing or lower.

October 10 marked the close of the irrigation season on the

Klamath project, when water was turned off in the main canals. At the close of the season the bureau of reclamation reservoirs showed the following available water storage:

Upper Klamath lake, 99,700

226,050 acre feet; Gerber reservoir, 45,340 acre feet.

Total storage recorded November 1, 1945, was 371,090 acre feet, which is an increase of 34,300 acre feet over 1944 total November 1, which was 336,790.

Clouds and occasional light rain have been predicted for Saturday, November 2.

## THEFT REPORTED TO CITY POLICE

Bob Husband, Claremont hotel, reported to police this morning the theft of a shotgun, carbine and several boxes of shells from his room during an absence of several days.

## 18 Blackouts On Pacific Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2 (P) — There were 18 blackouts, 30 radio silences and 25 alerts on the west coast between Dec. 7 and 31, 1941, Fourth AAF Headquarters said today.

"Of this total none were attributed to enemy action, while four alerts, six radio silences and 10 blackouts were said to 'unidentified causes,' headquarters said in a release outlining west coast air raid alerts and blackouts during the war.

Although many reports were received in late 1941 of unidentified planes, there was no actual bombing of the west coast until the following September when Japanese planes twice dropped incendiary bombs in southern Oregon.

## Medford Unit Of GOP Council Organized

MEDFORD, Nov. 2 (P) — Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, state president of the Council of Oregon Republican Women, has organized a Medford unit of the group.

The unit is the 30th set up in 21 Oregon counties.
