

PELS READY FOR AXEMEN CLASH

K-Men Going Into Game As Underdogs Again

Tonight's Encounter Last Of Season On Modoc Field; Gate Open At 7

For the third successive weekend our Pelicans are going into a football game on the short end of the odds, but tonight's scrap with the Eugene Axemen will find the Pels in better condition, physically and mentally, to break into the win column than they have been since early in the season.

It's the last high school game before the home folks for a lot of the first string—Selby, Nelson, Foust, Wirth, Vanderhoff, Sari, Thurman, Pope, Reed and Thompson are all seniors and their playing days on Modoc field will be ended with the game tonight.

All this week the lads have been sloshing around in the mud and rain running play after play, trying to work out a winning combination to throw against the Axemen and Coach Paul Angstead figures that if his line doesn't buckle the Pelicans have a good chance of upsetting the Eugene eleven.

As usual the Pels are out-weighted, five pounds per man in the starting line and 20 per man in the backfield.

The Axemen backfield boasts a 180-pound fullback, a 170-pound blocking back and a pair of halfbacks weighing 165 and 160. That's compared to Sari's 173, Coleman's 135, Edwards' 150 and Redkey's 140.

Eugene has won four games this season, from Bend, University high, Springfield and Albany, and has lost to Corvallis and Medford. In fact, the Axemen have scored the only points against the Tornado this year, the score was Medford 52, Eugene 7.

Coach Angstead has announced his starting lineup as Pope and Selby, ends, Foust and Reed, tackles, Wirth and Eastman, guards, Vanderhoff, center, Coleman, quarter, Sari, left half, Redkey, right half, and Edwards at fullback.

Redkey was hurt at Eureka last week and hasn't been doing much in practice, but he'll start the game and probably alternate with Moeabee and DeVore. Nelson and Thurman are both ailing and may not see action at all.

General admission tickets to the field will go on sale at the gate at 7 o'clock, and the game, last one of the 1945 Pels on Modoc field, gets under way at 8.

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Teddies Win Pair Of Touch Tackle Games

Playing off the second half of the game which was called because of darkness several days ago, Roosevelt school scored one more touchdown against Fairview yesterday afternoon to win 13-0.

Rod Davis took the opening kickoff and dashed 55 yards for the tally. An end sweep for the extra point failed. Roosevelt was leading 7-0 when the first half of the split game was ended.

In the second game on Mills field, Roosevelt playing Fremont, Davis intercepted a Fremont pass on the Fremont 30 and ran 25 yards down to the 5. Dietz scored on a pass from Webb and a pass for extra point failed.

The second and third quarters were scoreless and most of the play in the center of the field.

Then in the fourth canto Davis again took a Fremont pass on the Fremont 20 and scampered over the goal line. A pass for the point was no good, and the game ended, 12-0, for Roosevelt.

Gordon Davis, McIntyre and Dover played good ball for Fremont but lacked a scoring punch. The loss eliminates Fremont for the touch-tackle tourney.

Riverside and Roosevelt tangle in a semi-final scramble on Mills field this afternoon to see who will meet Mills for the championship Monday. Mills has defeated both those schools during the tourney.

Wedemeyer, Gaels Face Showdown

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 2 (AP)—St. Mary's Gaels and Halfback Herman Wedemeyer face the showdown tomorrow.

Touted by many sports writers and coaches as the top team and player in the west this season, the Gaels and their Hawaiian ace meet Southern California's bulky Trojans in the Coliseum before a crowd that may top 85,000.

The Gaels have breezed through five straight opponents—California, Stockton field, Nevada, College of Pacific and McClellan field. They have chalked up 204 points to the opposition's 13 and risen to eighth place in the Associated Press national rating.

And "Hurricane Herman," as the St. Mary's publicists bill him, has made it all possible. Sure, there are always 10 other guys on the field with Wedemeyer, his supporters admit, but look at what Herman's done: Completed 40 of 50 passes for 756 yards, including eight touchdowns; scored three touchdowns himself while picking up 283 more yards; placekicked 13 conversion points in 15 tries; punted out of bounds three times inside the opposition's five-yard line; threw key blocks for several scoring runs by fellow hula-hipper, Charles (Spike) Cordairo.

That, Gael followers insist, adds up to all-America status, although the opposition admittedly has not been top-drawer.

Sonja Will Separate From Wealthy Spouse

CHICAGO, Nov. 2 (AP)—Sonja Henie, ice skating champion and movie actress, and Daniel Reed Topping, wealthy New York sportsman, have decided to separate after a marriage of a little over five years, says their attorney, J. Arthur Friedlund.

Topping returned yesterday from overseas service in the marine corps. They have no immediate plans for a divorce, Friedlund said.

Their marriage in Chicago on July 4, 1940, was the first for Sonja and Topping's third. He was divorced in May, 1940, from Arline Judge, movie actress.
