Conference reports were the main feature of the Soroptimist meeting on Thursday. President Kathleen Thompson and the various members and delegates who attended the conference of Northwest Region of Soroptimist clubs in Portland last weekend, gave interesting accounts of what other clubs are doing throughout the region.

Mrs. Anna B. Sprott, past president of the National Federation of Soroptimist clubs, paid the Klamath Falls club a compliment on the project that has been carried on here for the past year and one-half, that is "Soroptimist House." This project has served approximately 200 service men and their wives by furnishing them a home at moderate rental when houses and apartments were very difficult to obtain.

Vancouver, B. C., club has a similar project.

Another interesting project adopted by the Canadian clubs was the raising of funds to help rehabilitate a certain town in England. They chose Coventry as one that needed help and to date have raised \$1850 and sent it over there for use in its rebuilding program.

The need of entertainment for girls in Klamath county detention cottage was stressed, and the club voted to donate books and games for the use of these girls.

The club was also asked to donate books for the libraries of Russia, some of which were completely destroyed during the war. It was noted that English is being taught in all Russian schools and those who could spare two or three English classics from their home libraries could do a great service by donating them to this collection.
