

Sex-Crazed Japs Put Naked British Women In Open Shop Windows

LONDON, Nov. 5 (AP)—It was a "common occurrence" for sex-crazed Japanese in Manila to strip British women and place them naked in shop windows on public display a week at a time, a high ranking British officer reported today to the United Nations war crimes commission.

The officer, whose name was withheld by the commission, asserted that "shooting is too good" for the Japanese and "I hope they will be hanged."

In a letter to the commission the officer, who had interviewed men and women tortured by the Japanese, said that 19 nurses who "refused to submit to these sex maniacs were taken out and bayoneted to death in front of other female prisoners, who had to bury them."

Detailing other atrocities, he wrote:

"Our troops found a woman and she was dead, thank God. Lighted cigarettes were in her nostrils. There were other atrocious details, which are quite unprintable."

He suggested that the commission "show my letter to anyone who is sorry for the Jap."

MANILA, Nov. 5 (AP)—A Filipino testified today he heard Japanese Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita angrily refuse to revoke an order to "kill all Filipinos and destroy all their cities."

He was Joaquin Galang, second witness brought from protective custody as a suspected collaborator, at the war crimes trial of the erstwhile "Tiger of Malaya."

The first was Narciso Lapus, who admitted freely that he was friendly with the Japanese invaders, then directly accused Yamashita of having ordered the islands "rid of Filipinos before the Americans return."

Galang testified that Yamashita showed great anger when Gen. Artemio Ricarte, Filipino politico-militarist, beseeched the Nipponese commander in the Philippines: "I take this time to ask you again to revoke your general order to kill all Filipinos and destroy all their cities."

"Order is an order," Yamashita rose, Galang said, clenched his hands and shouted angrily: "An order is an order! It is my order and because of that it should not be disobeyed! It should be followed — happen what may happen!"

The witness said he overheard the argument at Ricarte's house. Galang quoted Ricarte as saying to the general earlier:

"Nobody is at fault for the Filipinos' turning guerrilla, except that the Japanese are taking their food and torturing them."

Yamashita's answer, Galang said, was:

"Let's not talk about this any longer. The Filipinos are treacherous, hence they are our enemies."

Yamashita's counsel strongly attacked the credibility of Galang and asked him why, since he had been held in protective custody nearly eight months, he had only now seen occasion to tell his story.

Galang replied that it was his duty to see that Yamashita was brought to justice, and that he wanted to tell his story only when it would do the most good.

The prosecution also presented a series of witnesses who testified that Japanese troops fired and dynamited Manila's downtown buildings.

Lapus' testimony, closely linking Yamashita with atrocities he is accused of having condoned by troops of his command, came, surprisingly, under cross

examination by the general's sharp-questioning chief attorney, Col. Harry Clarke. This is the seventh day of Yamashita's war crimes trial before a U. S. commission of five generals.

Witness Nervous

Under Clarke's incisive questioning, Lapus appeared nervous and hesitant at times. As a prosecution witness Saturday, he easily answered questions in rapid-fire fashion. He testified that Yamashita ordered the execution of all Manila Filipinos friendly to the Americans. Today he said the general had ordered the killing of all Filipinos who were hostile to the Japanese at any point of the American landings, or acted friendly to the United States.

Again, Lapus testified that Ricarte had attended a rally last

year of Makapilis at which Yamashita and Benigno Ramos were present. Makapilis were disloyal Filipinos who fought, under the leadership of Ramos, with the Japanese against the Americans. Saturday, Lapus had pictured Ricarte as "a friend of all Filipinos, considered by the Japanese as one of the gods to his countrymen." Thus twice today he modified the story he told Saturday.

Although on Saturday Lapus repeatedly said he had implicit faith in Ricarte, he stated today "Ricarte lived a long time in Japan. He had traits of their trickery and secretness in actions."

The prosecution objected and demanded that Lapus be permitted to qualify this statement, but the defense carefully steer-

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5 (AP)—John B. Woolrich, San Francisco truck operator accused of transporting \$12,000 worth of stolen whisky from Los Angeles to Oregon City, Ore., will be brought north this week to face charges.

He consented to face charges in Oregon Saturday at a U. S. commissioners' hearing, failed to post \$5000 bail and will go north in custody.

John B. Vincent, federal bureau of investigation chief here, said all six men charged with transporting the stolen whisky, two in Portland and the remainder in California. The two held in Portland already have been sentenced to five months in jail for violating Oregon state liquor laws, but all six will be tried in Oregon on federal charges.
