COAST PREPARED WHEN JAPS STRUCK

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5 (AP)—A vast network of ground observers, radar stations, filter and information centers was ready for the air defense of the west coast when Japan attacked Pearl Harbor, the fourth air force disclosed Saturday.

California stations went to work on the afternoon of Dec. 7, with Oregon and Washington posts, then under the 2nd interceptor command of the 2nd air force, being fully activated the next day.

Seattle and Portland were information centers for the Pacific northwest. In Oregon 501 observation posts were in operation, with 334 in Washington.

Garland Funeral Rites To Be Held

LEBANON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Funeral services will be held today for Samuel M. Garland, 84, attorney and former state senator once active in Oregon highway development.

He died in a hospital here Saturday.

Born in Virginia, he came to Oregon in 1887 as President Cleveland's appointee to supervise Indian schools of the Umatilla reservation. He had lived here since 1890, when he began to practice law.
