

All Coast Grid Teams Have Blemished Records

Huskies Against OSC; Trojans Versus Bears Now On Docket

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5 (AP)—Pacific coast conference football, staggering through a ragged season with every team defeated at least once, spins its championship standings in the wheel of fortune this week-end through the medium of three games.

League leader University of Washington meets Oregon State college at Seattle and will be mildly favored to beat the neighboring state's eleven again in the second of their home and home series. Washington shut out OSC 13-0 in their initial encounter but will buck up against considerably improved opposition this time.

While Washington was seeking out a 7-0 win over the University of Oregon last Saturday, Oregon State uncocked a 34-0 victorious effort at the expense of the University of Idaho.

Second place University of Southern California like Wash-

ington defeated once in the conference; entertains University of California in a contest at Los Angeles. The Trojans whipped California 13-2 in their first meeting a few weeks ago but in the light of recent developments should be hard pressed to turn the tables again.

Defending conference champion, Southern California failed to look the part of a "major league" representative while taking a 26-0 trouncing from independent St. Mary's college last week.

Several factors indicate the Trojans will have a time on their hands from the California Bears, although the latter's football demonstrations this season certainly have not sent the fans into ecstasies.

However, California has a 27-14 win, its only conference victory, to its credit and the victim was the University of Washington. And Washington pulled out a 13-7 win over Southern California two weeks ago.

Meanwhile USC has just lost its two first string ends, Jim Callahan and Harry McKinney, through navy transfers. And California followers believe the team is due to come up with at least one bang-up effort. Next Saturday may be the day.

The third conference engagement will bring together Oregon and Washington State on the latter's Pullman field. Oregon won the first of their home and home clashes, 26-13 and barring unforeseen incidents figures to repeat. Washington State got away with a lucky 7-7 tie with California last week, although definitely outplayed on the statistical chart.

Jake Leicht, Oregon—Played a magnificent defensive game in backing up Oregon's line against Washington although Washington finally broke through in the last period to win 7-0.

Ed Cody, Purdue—Ran for two touchdowns and powered another scoring drive in 28-0 walloping of Pittsburgh.

Paul Copoulos, Marquette—Scored three times in 32-14 win over Detroit.

Dick Howard, Iowa State—Ran 98 and 106 yards for touchdowns to lead Iowa State to a 40-13 victory over Kansas State.

Max Schmittker and Ollie Cline, Ohio State—Former kicked a field goal from the 22-yard line with a minute and 28 seconds to go to give Ohio State a 16-14 victory over Northwestern; Cline gained 180 yards and scored both Buckeye touchdowns.

Howard Yerges, Michigan—Threw two passes to set up a touchdown and plunged for the Wolverines' first score as Michigan beat Minnesota 26-0.

Bronc-Riding Money Boys Seeking Gold In Boston

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—The vixen-kly boys packed their boots and saddles in Boston and headed into the stretch of the rodeo campaign with Bill Linderman of Red Lodge, Montana, riding herd on the unofficial national all-around cowboy crown.

Although there will be some bronc-busting at Dallas and Los Angeles before the season closes, the competition in the Boston Garden opening Thursday could clinch the title for Linderman, one of seven brothers from Red Lodge.

If Bill misses out on the championship, held by Louis Brooks of Sweetwater, Tex., for the last two years, Brother Bud probably will take the big money for they are running head and head. Counting a check for about \$6000 taken out of the New York competition, Bill has won almost \$20,000 for the season in recognized rodeos.

Oddly enough, Bill didn't win a single championship in the rodeo concluded at Madison Square Garden last night. He finished second to Brother Bud in the bareback bronc riding but copped enough prize money in the day-by-day competition to outshine all the others.

Toots Mansfield, a seasoned campaigner from Rankin, Tex., added the \$2000 calf roping championship to his laurels, the fourth time he has taken the event in the Garden. A second place in the bareback bronc contest topped his New York take to over \$5000.

Homer Pettigrew of Springer, N. Mex., more than doubled his previous Garden earnings by taking down first money of

\$2500 in the steer wrestling division. He downed eight steers in a total elapsed time of 103 1/5 seconds. Eddie Curtis of El Reno, Okla., was second.

Bart Clennon of Glenwood, Wash., just edged out Jerry Ambler of White Salmon, Wash., in the saddle bronc riding test and G. K. Lewallen of Blackwell, Tex., scored a decisive 500-point victory in the wild bull riding contest with Gerald and Ken Roberts, brothers from Strong City, Kan., placing second and third.

Shoat Webster of Lanahap, Okla., turned out to be best at coaxing milk out of wild cows during the 49-show run of the rodeo at the 49th street and 8th avenue corral.

The 213 cowboys split up \$145,825 as their share of the estimated gross gate of \$1,500,000, contributed by continuous sellout crowds of 15,000 wild west fans.

PORTLAND, Nov. 5 (AP)—The University of Washington battered out a slim 7-0 victory over the University of Oregon here Saturday to boost its Pacific coast conference football lead to five wins and a single loss.

The Rose Bowl-bound Huskies had rough going for their second win over the Webfoots. As Halfback Jake Leicht sparked Oregon's defense with every trick in his wide range of gridiron talents.

The Webfoots stayed off the touchdown until the fourth quarter, when Husky Quarterback Joe Stone finally fell onto pay dirt from the Oregon one-foot line. The Washington squad pounded the Oregon goal sector throughout the game, but consistent fumbling kept them away.

Twice within the game's opening minutes the Huskies moved to within the Oregon five, only to fall short of the goal and hand over the pigskin for an Oregon kick into safe ground.

A fumble by Oregon Quarterback Bob Reynolds late in the third quarter, recovered by Washington, set up the scoring offense. Five line and end plays put the Huskies on the Oregon one and they collected in the fourth period. Dash's placekick netted the extra point.
