SEARCH LAUNCHED FOR LOST PLANES
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5 (AP)—Army planes today searched the rugged mountain sector of the Cascade and coastal regions for wreckage of two Liberator bombers missing with their crews since last Thursday.
The search was concentrated south of Eugene, Ore., where a former civilian defense corpsman reported hearing two large planes circling overhead in the darkness about the time two others in the flight landed safely elsewhere.
The missing B-24s had a ten-hour supply of gasoline when they left McChord field, Tacoma, Wash., for the one-hour trip to Portland.
Only one of 10 men in the crews was from the northwest. He is Staff Sgt. Lowell Sauer, Rt. 1, box 2118, Bremerton, Wash.

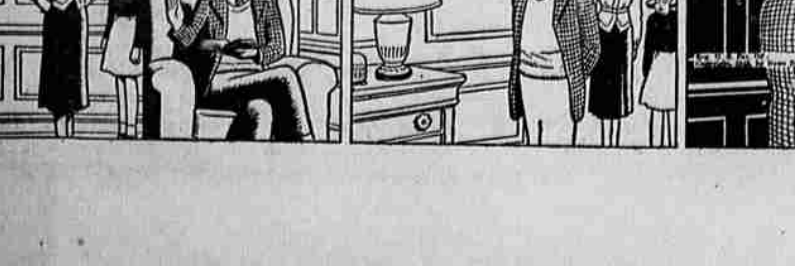
