

SHARE ATOMIC, SAYS MOLOTOV

LONDON, Nov. 6 (AP)—Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov called for an allied control of Japan in a Moscow address today and declared "there ought to be no secrecy about the subject of atomic energy."

In a broadcast address opening Russia's observance of the 28th anniversary of the Soviet revolution, Molotov asserted: "In the treatment of the de-

feated we should not let ourselves be guided by our feelings, but only by the necessity to prevent a new aggression. This applies to all countries which bear the responsibility for securing peace."

"We must then mention here the force of atomic energy which was experienced in the war with Japan. Nowadays there ought to be no secrecy about this subject."

This was the first time a high Soviet official had suggested that the United States and Great Britain share their practical knowledge of atomic energy as a means of warfare.

KLAMATH GAINS HALFWAY MARK IN FUND DRIVE

Klamath Community Fund drive is still underway with only a little over half the goal for 1945 reached to date, the committee reported Monday.

With only about half of the county covered so far, \$39,261.71 has already been received. W. E. Lamm, general chairman of the drive, stated, "It is hoped remaining contributions will be forthcoming immediately, to conclude the drive as quickly as possible."

Work throughout the county for contributions to the fund, has been held up due to strikes, Lamm said, but it will be continued until the goal is reached.

The national war chest and Oregon charities are beneficiaries of the fund, with 1946 activities dependent upon allotments received from this source. Some of the proposed programs of these organizations have been announced, and these worthwhile plans cannot be carried out, Lamm reminded, without the cooperation of the people in contributing to this cause.

Contributions may be mailed direct to the Klamath chamber of commerce, 323 Main, Lamm said, urging those who have not already contributed to do so as quickly as possible.

POLICE MAKE TWO TRAFFIC ARRESTS

Carmine D'Arina of the Marine Barracks posted \$5 bail with city police yesterday for an appearance in court for running a stop sign at 8th and Pine, and Delia E. Skelton, Route 2, Klamath Falls, posted \$2 bail for making an improper left turn on Main and 7th.

Thirteen drunks appeared in police court this morning, along with two persons held for disorderly conduct. Twelve drunks bailed out, \$10 each, and two Indians charged with possession of liquor, each paid \$25 bail.

Two traffic tickets were paid in court.

The city police have the following unclaimed articles, picked up in town recently:

One tire and wheel, one tire and rim, one pair of child's bone-rimmed glasses, a suit case believed to belong to a man named Austin Lewis, another brown suit case and a new hand truck.

A dark brown four-year-old mare, weighing about 800 pounds, which police captured on Eldorado a week ago, is unclaimed and will be sold November 8 unless claimed by the owner. There is no brand or mark on the horse.

Replaces Stalin
Molotov apparently was designated to make the traditional anniversary address in place of Generalissimo Stalin, who has just returned from vacation.

The Soviet monitor's version of Molotov's remarks concerning Japan was that the liberation of China was the greatest importance to the world.

"It is thus clear that the Soviet Union considers most important the negotiation of control of all the allies over Japan," he said. "In this question no satisfactory results have yet emerged, but the importance of satisfactory results is clear to all."

Molotov told a cheering crowd that, with victory in war, "now we can return to peacetime labor."

The foreign commissar, deputy chairman of the Council of Peoples' Commissars, said the main strongpoints of aggression in west and east had been liquidated. The radio said the celebration will be part of the job.

Final Rites For Quimby Saturday
Final rites for Gordon Quimby, owner of the Red Ball stage lines, who died Saturday following a brief illness, will be held Wednesday at 2 p. m. from the Elks temple. The Elks lodge will be in charge and the Elks ritual will be read.

Interment will follow in Linkville cemetery with Ward's Klamath Funeral home in charge.

Lake O' Woods Road Undergoes Repair
Improvement work on the road west of Upper Klamath lake was begun by the state highway commission November 1, and is expected to be completed within six weeks.

A six-man crew under W. N. Gibson is doing the work which includes filling in some low places, straightening parts, and surfacing the length from the Geary ranch to Harriman lodge. Replacement of three or four culverts will be part of the job.

"When the Germans invade us they counted on the unexpectedness of their attack," Molotov said in a version heard by the Soviet monitor.

"Germany's attack was also a test for our foreign friends, who watched with bated breath the difficulties of our country."

"The Soviet country withstood the test."

Molotov recalled how a "united anti-Hitler front" of large and small democratic countries was formed and how the red army assumed the offensive.

"The Anglo-Soviet-American coalition was successful," he said. "The second front in western Europe, with Germany in a vice, made Germany's position impossible."

He said the Soviet power was quite unlike that of the czarist regime of the first World war and declared: "The Soviet state can survive the hardest tests in history."
