New Business Building Planned For Klamath Falls

New Coca-Cola Bottling Company Plant In Klamath Falls Will Be Typical Of Postwar Architecture

Modern to the smallest detail and the tiniest piece of equipment, the new building housing the Coca-Cola Bottling company to be located on Main and Spring across from the armory, will be typical of the light, spacious, postwar architecture designed for comfort and practicality.

The new plant will cover an area of about 12,000 square feet and is expected to cost from \$40,000 to \$50,000. Work is scheduled to begin this week and the building is planned to be ready for occupancy and operation in the spring of 1946. Contractor of the project is Fred Lekberg. Howard Perrin is the architect.

The outside of the building will be finished in white stucco and masonry block, with tile at the entrance. Glass block will enclose the office area.

One feature of the building will be the partial glass enclosure of the bottling department at the corner of Main and Spring. It will be walled on two sides by sloped glass so that the work inside will be plainly visible from the street, enabling people to watch the bottling process. Service offices will be separated from the bottling department by a large window.

Warehouse
In back of the main offices and bottling section will be the warehouse. The structure, spanned with trusses, will have an open-type planning leaving an almost clear area for storage and warehouse purposes.

USCG RECRUITER IN KLAMATH FALLS

MM 1/c Alfred Switzer, of the U. S. coast guard is in Klamath Falls for three days recruiting 17 to 25-year-old men for coast guard service. He may be contacted at the Klamath County chamber of commerce office, 323 Main.

Switzer, traveling recruiter attached to the district recruiting office in Seattle, has seen nine years of service including two war-time years overseas. He says, "The coast guard offers a wide variety of interesting assignments in its versatile peacetime military and law enforcement program, and recruits have the opportunity for training and advancement in many fields."

Enlistments in the coast guard have been limited to 17-year-olds until last Wednesday when they were opened to men up to 25 years of age. Applicants must be American citizens, have completed two years of high school education, possess 20-30 vision and be at least 64 inches in height.

They may enlist for either two or three years, for training in aviation, aids to navigation, carpentry, commissary, electronics, gunnery, navigation, photography, radar, radio, seamanship and office work.
