

Growers Want 1946 Farm Labor Program Kept On Same Basis

Continuation of Oregon's farm labor program in 1946 on essentially the same basis as this year was requested by representatives of farm labor sponsoring committees from 14 of the state's heavy labor-using counties at a recent meeting in Portland.

The growers asked that the Oregon State college extension service continue to administer the program in Oregon. The sponsoring committee members also recommended that machinery be available for bringing in farm workers from other states or elsewhere in case adequate help is not available next year from local sources.

POTATO LOANS NOW AVAILABLE FOR GROWERS

United States department of agriculture, through the commodity credit corporation is supporting the price of Irish potatoes at announced support levels. In the early and intermediate states this support has been in the form of direct government purchase. In districts growing late potatoes, such as the Klamath district, the support at the present time is only in the form of loans. Application for these loans can be made at the county AAA office in the federal building and are available only until December 15. At the present time if loans are not applied for before that date, the support price is not assured. Present support prices are U. S. 1's FOB cars November \$2.20; December \$2.30. U. S. 2's FOB cars is 50 per cent of the U. S. No. 1 price. These supports continue at the December rate through the remainder of the marketing season.

When growers apply for the loan a grade inspection is made by the state federal shipping point inspection service, the loan being based on the grade. The cash advanced on the loan is \$1.39 per hundred for 1's and 47 cents on 2's less 2 cents service charge. The balance of the support price will be paid FOB cars. In case potatoes show deterioration a re-inspection should immediately be asked for by the grower.

Inasmuch as the national potato crop is now estimated by the crop reporting service as the second largest in history, provision is now being made by the department to make the best possible use of surplus potatoes. Certain outlets or diversions for non-food purposes have been developed. It is now planned to supply these outlets from those potatoes owned by the government or those potatoes under loan reported to be threatened by deterioration. This is an important feature of the loan. In fact, insurance of support prices and the possibility of diversion are two very important items in the loan of definite advantage to growers.

Separate Ways Lead To War

Said Secretary of Agriculture Anderson at the Quebec conference of the United Nations Food and Agriculture organization: "In the period between the World wars, I believe all the nations represented here discovered how futile it is in a world so interdependent as ours for any of us to attempt to solve alone our complex problems in agricultural and industrial trade. We went our separate ways in the period between the wars with many sincere and large-scale efforts. Consider where these separate ways took us. The failure of the nations of the world to think in international terms after the last war helped to make the second World war possible and, to some extent, inevitable. I am sure that none of us wants to follow again those separate though sometimes enticingly sovereign paths that in our small world lead through a maze of confused economics to the horrible crossroads of war."

FARMERS WILL REPORT ON OWN CONSERVATION

Klamath county farmers and ranchers again this year will serve as their own "supervisors" in reporting performance of soil and water conserving practices under the 1945 agricultural conservation program, Burrell Short, chairman of the county AAA committee, said today.

Farmers who participated in the practice program are asked to call at the county office to make reports on the work accomplished. These reports will form the basis of applications for payment, through which the government shares with the operator in the cost of improvements to protect soil and water resources.

Receipts Required

Receipts or other evidence showing kind and amount of seed or material are required in connection with application of lime, phosphate, sulphur and gypsum, chemical weed control, and pasture seeding, in connection with the poundage payment for harvesting alfalfa clover, red clover, and alfalfa, sales receipts showing the amount of clean seed marketed are necessary.

Cost statements are needed with certain earth-moving and construction practices, such as drainage ditches, irrigation structures, dams and reservoirs. Field inspections of these prac-

tices and of range improvement practices will be made by community committees and supervisors. Legal descriptions and maps or sketches showing field boundaries are required where these records are not on file in the county office or are not up-to-date the chairman said. This is necessary, he explained, so that proper records can be maintained of conservation practices performed on all farms and ranches in the county.

Weyerhaeuser Worker Burned

Phil Dozier, 65, resident of Ashland and employed at the Weyerhaeuser Timber company camp, suffered painful burns to his arms and chest when a can of scalding coffee tipped over on him early Wednesday evening.

Dozier was brought to Hillsdale hospital for treatment. His condition was said to be good today. Dozier said he was in the kitchen during the dinner hour last night and was moving one of the cans of hot coffee on a rack when the accident occurred. He is employed as choker setter at the camp.
