Kiwanians at their meeting Thursday heard an inspiring address by Dr. D. J. Ferguson, pastor of the Presbyterian church of Merrill, touching on a number of national and international questions.

The minister said he favors retention of the atomic bomb secret by the United States, at least "until Russia is willing to

tell its secrets and sit down at the table in a franker spirit than has thus far prevailed."

He spoke strongly for continuation of distinctive branches of the armed services, with the president of the United States as commander in chief.

Dr. Ferguson declared that General Eisenhower is the greatest soldier in history. Rev. David Barnett introduced the speaker.

IRAN DENOUNCES RED OCCUPATION

TEHRAN, Nov. 8 (AP)—The Iran parliament heard protests today about continued Russian occupation of parts of the country.

Dr. R. Etebar, a deputy, told the legislature: "Iran fulfilled its pledge to the United Nations charter, particularly toward Russia. The evacuation of Iran has been announced and confirmed by United Nations leaders. Despite this, I regret that today the red army occupies 45 buildings in Tehran and the Russian occupation army headquarters still are not evacuated."

"Twelve thousand fresh Russian troops have landed at the port of Bandar Shahr (on the Caspian sea), 80,000 in Astaria and new divisions arrived recently at Azarbaijan. Why are our gendarmes hindered by the Russian military when they move northward to restore order?"

Premier Hakimi received an almost unanimous vote of confidence.

Two Klamath Men, Former German PW's, Discharged

S/Sgt. Rodney D. Bortis and S/Sgt. Joe R. Richey, both of Klamath Falls and also having in common the fact that they were held prisoners of war of the German army until their liberation on V-E Day have received honorable discharges from the United States army. Both were air corps men serving as gunners with the 8th air force. Bortis was a member of a Liberator crew. Richey flying with a B-17 outfit.

Bortis, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Bortis, 640 Roseway drive, became a civilian at Fort George Wright, Wash., October 31. He was a veteran of 34 months service including a 10-month tour of duty in the European theater. Bortis was shot down and reported missing February 17, 1945, and liberated May 14, 1945. He was a tail-gunner on a Liberator and received the Purple Heart, Air Medal with three Oak Leaf clusters, European Theater of Operation ribbon with two campaign stars. Bortis plans to enter the University of Washington to study medicine.

Held prisoner from February 11, 1944, to May 28, 1945, Sgt. Richey had many months in a German camp. He was in the United States army air corps for 52 months including a 20-month tour of duty in Europe. He served as an armorer-gunner on a Flying Fortress and wears the Air Medal, Purple Heart, European Theater of Operations ribbon with four campaign stars. Prior to entering the service, Richey was utility man at California Oregon Power company. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Richey, Roseburg and formerly of this city, and his wife is the former Virginia Lee Morin, 115 N. 10th. He was also discharged at Fort George Wright.

PORTLAND, Nov. 8 (AP)—Gresham is going to have two "pioneers" and a covered wagon this winter.

Jack Ratliff and Orville Ewing, Pritchett, Colo., pulled into Portland yesterday with two covered wagons that are their answer to poor health and high living costs.

One wagon was pulled by a trio of burros; the other by two donkeys and an ox, shod in automobile tires. Goats, hens, and a dog trailed along.

"I figger on winter in Gresham, if I can lease a shed at the fairgrounds," said Ratliff, who has been traveling in his covered wagon since 1941. "This life ain't bad, but I've seen things I like better."

Ratliff started off when, he said, doctors told him he had tuberculosis. Since then he's covered 12,000 miles.

Life is very cheap that way,

he explained. "My four hens give me eggs. My goats give me milk." And then he makes a bit extra by selling postcards of his troupe.
