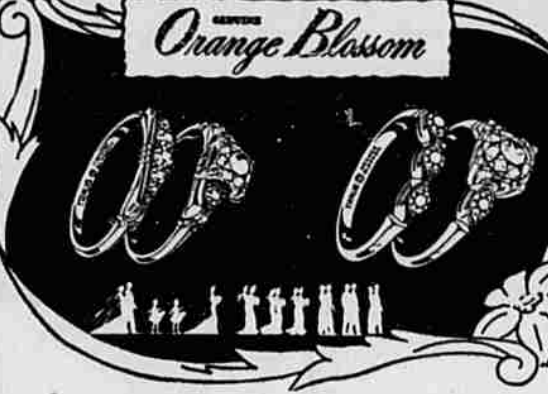

Japs Claim Reds Occupy 5 Islands

TOKYO, Nov. 9 (AP)—Japanese sources said today Russia had occupied five small islands off the east coast of Hokkaido, northernmost of the Japanese home islands.

Relatively light Soviet forces, the sources said, occupied Kunashiri, Shikotan, Shikoku, Suisho and Taraku islands.
