

Pels Ending Season With Lava Bears

Tonight's Tilt At Bend Closes Schedule; Squad Slated For Jamboree

The Pelicans, 30-strong, left for Bend this morning, heading into their final game of the 1945 season, the annual Armistice windup with the Lava Bears.

Practice sessions this week have been more cold than arduous. If the Pels are as good now as they were last week against Eugene they should work out a win over the Lava Bears, so scrimmages this week were mostly on a test-you-forget basis with some emphasis on aerial warfare.

Coch Anstead plans to start virtually the same line-up tonight as started against the Axemen. That puts Coleman at quarter, Sari at left half, Redkey at right half and Edwards at full in the back-field.

The starting line will probably have Selby and Pope on the flanks, Reed and Rose in at tackles, Wirth and Eastman at guard and Vanderhoff will be the pivot man.

Rose is expected to get his starting nod since Foust, injured last week, did not make the trip. Barker, Gerbino and Hicks were also left at home, Barker and Hicks because of injuries and Gerbino as he was declared ineligible by reason of scholastic difficulties.

At last report the weather at Bend was cold without much snow. The field is expected to be clear of snow for tonight's tilt, but overcoats and horse-blankets will be number one priority items in the stands.

The weather has also cancelled a number of prospective football trips planned by Klamath fans, although there will probably be a sizable detachment of Pelican student and grown-up boosters in the section reserved for the visiting delegation.

The Pelicans are conceded a slight edge, hardly amounting to more than one touchdown, over the Lava Bears, who have gained only a single victory in six starts this season.

After the game the Pels will stay overnight in Bend, then rush home tomorrow morning in time for an appearance in the gridiron jamboree on Modoc field tomorrow afternoon. A squad of Pelican reserves will replace Bonanza as the eighth team in the jamboree.

Seven Teams In Race For Rose Bowl Bid

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9 (AP) The choice for the eastern representative in the Rose Bowl today narrowed to seven teams following a meeting of the Rose Bowl committee.

In the running for the New Year's Day game are Army, Alabama, Columbia, Notre Dame, Holy Cross, Mississippi State and Texas.

The committee indicated feelers might be extended to these schools before the next meeting, some 10 days off, but that no institution had yet been approached.

The western representative in the Bowl probably will be the Pacific coast conference champion (Washington is leading at present). However local sports scribes are putting on a campaign for the non-conference St. Mary's Gaels, the only undefeated, untied team on the coast, to represent the west.

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Frosh Drill For Revenge At Medford

K-Men Slated To Cross Mountain For Peapicker Return Game Tomorrow

Out to avenge the 13-0 defeat handed to them in their first ball game of the season, the KUHS freshmen, eleven are getting in shape to meet Medford's junior high on their own field Saturday.

ARMY FAVORED OVER IRISH

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (AP)—Notre Dame, held to a 6-6 tie by Navy, gets its chance tomorrow to spring the upset of the year when they battle Army's national champions at the Yankee stadium in the No. 1 college football game of the day.

Lured by the prospect of seeing Army's 15-game winning streak go by the boards, despite all evidence to the contrary, a sellout crowd of 76,000 will be in the stands.

Notre Dame has been waiting for a year to wipe out that 59-0 trimming Army scored in 1944, but the betting fraternity has made the West Point Cadets three touchdown favorites.

While this meeting between the No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the most recent Associated Press national poll, rates top ranking, there are other games that promise to be hammer and tong battles.

Navy and Michigan come to grips at Baltimore in a game that many think will see the Middles lose their first game. Michigan, beaten early in the season by Indiana and Army, now is regarded as a November powerhouse.

At Philadelphia, Columbia risks its unbeaten, untied record against a favored Pennsylvania eleven beaten only by Navy and that in the last 25 seconds.

Indiana, seeking its first western conference title, takes on a Minnesota team that is raging to get back on the winning side after last week's thumping by Michigan.

The unbeaten and untied Oklahoma Aggies battle once-beaten Tulsa for the Missouri valley title and a probable Bowl bid. A year ago Tulsa lost a 46-40 thriller.

Mississippi State, knocked out of the unbeaten ranks by Tulane last week, will try to rebound against a favored Louisiana State aggregation, beaten only by powerful Alabama.

On the Pacific coast California, beaten 13-2 by Southern California early in the season, tries to turn the tables on the USC while Washington risks its Rose Bowl prospects against Oregon State.

Other leading games include Temple vs. Penn State; Georgia Tech-Tulane; Colgate-Cornell;

Lipscomb seems to be about the only grappler currently on the circuit who can hold his own against Jones, although the negro mauler copped a decision from Lipscomb last week.
