Brief History
W. F. Jinnette, senior elder of the local church gave a brief history. The church was organized in 1905 with 12 charter members, three of them, Mr. and Mrs. George Offield, Merrill, and Mrs. Laura Hill now living. Services were first held in the schoolhouse and some time later in the old Merrill opera house, since burned. Rev. Arthur Tweed assisted with solicitation of a \$2100 fund for building the present building which was dedicated October 28, 1906. He is still pastor of a church at Mill City, Ore.

Much of the lumber used in the present building was milled in the Turner mill, operated on Mt. Stukel. The first manse was put up in 1909 and several years ago the present home for the pastor was completed. R. H. Anderson, Merrill pioneer, now living in Klamath Falls, helped with the milling as a sawyer.

The Merrill church, oldest in the Lost River parish, has been the parent church of those at Malin and at Tulelake.

New Church
Plans are under consideration for a new church to fill the need for more room and as a "cornerstone" Rev. Bronson auctioned a silk quilt made by Mrs. W. P. Jinnette during the dinner which went to Lewis Kandra for \$125.

Members of the Albany church choir, Sara Ellen Worley, piano; Myra Fern Walker, violinist; Billie Balsiger, whistler; Helen Unfred, soprano, and James Jenks, tenor, appeared in concert following the dinner. An appreciative audience has asked for the further appearance of the talented group and plans are being considered for a series of concerts during the winter.

The anniversary service on Sunday was largely attended with the same artists and local talent assisting Dr. Ferguson.

RFC Sales Centers Will Close Doors

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP)—Portland-Troutdale and Olympia, Wash., Reconstruction Finance corporation sales centers will close after the last five surplus army planes are sold, RFC said today.

Officials said 109 planes have

been sold at Portland-Troutdale—where the five are left—since April for a total of about \$175,000. "We could sell another hundred if we could get them," RFC spokesmen declared, but there was no sign new stocks would arrive from storage fields down south.
