

Mustangs Have Claim On County Grid Laurels

MALIN—The Malin Mustangs, with six wins, no losses and a scoreless tie for their record this season, have hung their

uniforms without the formality of putting in a bid for the county title. Coach A. E. Street, summarizing the season, stated that Henley, Merrill and Malin will let the scores tell the tale for this year and leave a title decision to another season. In a good grid season despite a manpower shortage, Malin

was stopped only by the Henley Hornets, a 0-0 deadlock, and took the other six games easily. The Mustangs beat Sacred Heart 19-6, Merrill 13-0, Wildcats 7-0, Butte Valley 28-0, KUHBS freshmen 14-7 and Bonanza 34-0. Street's starters had Bob Victorine, L.E.; Con McAuliffe, L.T.; Bob Cantrall, L.G.; Ted Gordon, C.; Jack Lindsay, R.G.; Bill McMurtry, R.T.; Clifford McKeown, R.E.; Andy Fields, Q.B.; Corky Ellis, L.H.; Ernie Arnold, R.H. and George Spolek, F.B. Reserves included Gilbert Kinkle, John Baker, John Saunders, Virgil Ratliff and Robert Unruh. First call for basketball candidates at Malin will come Monday.

Six county cage teams are slated to play a round-robin basketball tournament in February, according to plans made by county coaches meeting in Klamath Falls recently. Gilchrist, Chiloquin, Malin, Merrill, Bonanza and Henley are already agreed on the tourney, and Sacred Heart and the Lakeview district winner may be included in the meet.

Riverside and Fremont, both undefeated, will meet in the first tilt and Roosevelt and Mills, each with one loss, in the night-cap.

Pels End Season With 39-0 Win Over Bend

Snow and Rain Fail To Hamper Klamath's Running Assault

Suddenly getting hot on a cold night at Bend, the Pelicans romped over the Bend Lava Bears 39-0 last night and ended their 1945 season in a flash of glory. Skidding over a wet field through a downpour of snow and rain, the Pels outplayed the Lava Bears all the way along. Klamath Falls rang up 15 first downs to a lonesome one for the Bend boys and our line so completely rushed the Lava Bear ball-handlers they went in the hole on total yardage gained.

For the initial score in the first period, Thompson recovered a Bend fumble on the Lava Bears' 16. Nelson on an end around got down to the three. Sari plowed to about four inches from pay dirt and Coleman went over. Try for point no good.

For the second marker Tommy Edwards danced around his left end, peeked up blocking when he tried to block and scammed 78 yards down the sidelines over the goal line. Coleman passed to Sari for the extra point. Score, 13-0.

Getting the offensive again a few minutes later, the K-men sustained an 82-yard power march down the field and Coleman flipped a pass to Sari in the end zone from the three to score. Coleman's drop kick was good, making the count 20-0.

In the third canto Klamath tallied on a 39-yard drive, including a 34-yard gallop by Edwards which put the oval just a yard away from the double stripe. Coleman went over on a quarterback sneak. His pass for conversion was no good.

Bend had the ball early in the final quarter but were backed all the way down to their own goal and tried to punt out. The kick was blocked and Sari fell on the ball in the end zone for six points. Coleman's place kick made the score 33-0.

It was Edwards again just before the game ended, scoring on a flashy 47-yard jaunt that put the score at 39-0. Only a small crowd braved the miserable weather to see the game. The Bend field was not snowbound but plenty wet and slippery.

Ramsey Starring For Chicago Bears

Harry Mesner of Big Lakes Box company has received a letter from Frank Ramsey, former KUHBS football coach now playing pro ball with the Chicago Bears, written just after the Bears topped the Green Bay Packers 28-24 on Wrigley field last Sunday.

Big Frank joined the Bears at guard just after he got out of the marine corps a few weeks ago and is doing so well that his coming back to Klamath Falls to coach the game is apparently out of the question. Last Sunday's upset was the Bears' first National pro league win after five defeats, played before 45,527 fans, and according to Ramsey's letter the big guys were just as jubilant over the victory as a high school squad is after a win.

Here is Ramsey's letter in part: "... I truly believe it was the greatest game I've ever been near. You never saw such a ball club in all your life. We gave them three touchdowns and still beat hell out of them... I called the defensive signals and Hunk and Luke (Hunk Anderson and Luke Johnsons, Bear coaches) told me I didn't call a wrong defense all day... they only made a total of 31 yards rushing."

The Bears close out their league season December 2 and Ramsey is planning to come home shortly after that.

Full-Creel Dividends In Fish Experiment
The experimental eradication of trash fish from South Twin lake and subsequent restocking with rainbow trout paid full-creel dividends to anglers during the 1945 season and the state game commission expects the lake to be even more of a fisherman's paradise next year.

Fifteen years ago the lake was famous for its plentiful and sizable trout, until over-enthusiastic anglers turned chubs loose in the water to supplement the trout food supply. However, some of the chubs survived to spawn, increasing rapidly until they were making serious inroads in the food available for newly planted young trout.

So the decision was made to kill all the fish in the lake and start over again. Using rotenone, some 5,200,000 chub were killed, and only seven trout recovered from the lake. After resting the water a year, a total of 89,195 rainbow trout have been loosed in the lake since 1942 in three plantings. The fish average three inches when planted.

The lake was opened to angling late in May, with catches limited to not more than 10 trout in a seven-day period. In 63 days more than three thousand fishermen wet a line in the lake, hauling out 9365 fish averaging slightly better than a pound each and, what's more important, very few anglers failed to make a catch.

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MEDFORD WINS AGAIN, 52-0

Oregon's first district laurels in the 1945 prep gridiron race were resting today on the heads of a powerful T-formation eleven: the Grant Generals of Portland.

Grant outkidded Jefferson on a muddy field last night to clinch the Portland league crown with a 14-6 victory and take the title of district 4.

The Generals, champion two years ago and runner-up last year, will now play off against the southern Oregon district titlist in the state semi-finals.

Both the undefeated southern Oregon squads white-washed another pair of schools last night: North Bend 25-0 over Marshfield; Medford 52-0 over Ashland. The two play off next weekend for the title.

Medford's victory brought its season score to 452 points to opponents' 7, and ended the southern Oregon conference season. The other three conference contenders ended tied for second place.

The crucial eastern Oregon district game between Hood River and The Dalles was postponed until Monday because of the Armistice holiday.

Cottage Grove, powerful title contender in district 3's southern subdivision, roared over Springfield, 13-0 last night for its sixth straight victory.

McMinnville, leading contender in the northern subdivision, was idle. The once-tied squads in the subdivision marked new victories: Columbia Prep 32-0 over Seaside, Sabin of Portland 13-6 over the Gresham Gophers.

Eugene wound up its season with a 13-0 defeat of Salem to assure the Axemen a runner-up spot in the No-Name league. Corvallis is riding for the No-Name crown with a closing game against Albany Monday.

The Blue Mountain conference will also end Monday. Much of the weekend prep slate was still hanging fire today, with usual Friday games scheduled for tonight or Monday.
