# Soroptimists Hear Mr. Gralapp

A most interesting and instructive program was presented at the Soroptimist club meeting on Thursday. Excerpts from the Charter of the United Nations embracing the provisions on equality for women were read by the legislative chairman, Annabelle Newton.

President Kathleen Thompson announced that the next meeting on November 15 will be a Thanksgiving program and also the bond meeting for sale of Victory Loan bonds. Each member was urged to come prepared to buy to the limit of her resources and help put over this last bond drive.

A program of interest to club members was called to their attention by Alice Lamm. This will be the forum of the air broadcast on next Tuesday.

Arnold Gralapp, superintendent of the city schools, was the principal speaker for the day, his topic being "Planning for American Youth." Mr. Gralapp emphasized the fact that we will have many more boys and girls to educate in the next few years, as the birth rate in the United States has increased tremendously, and the trend of education will need to be considerably changed, due to the fact. People are leaving the cities and going out on small acreages. Result of these migrations to the country will be more neighborhood schools, and many such schools are now being designed to fit the architecture of their special area. He also stated that there would not be jobs for all boys and girls just out of high school, and communities would have to assume the responsibility for junior college work.

A new program in physical education is being considered which will be adapted to the special needs of students, so that each student may have the kind of physical training best suited to give him health and correct any minor physical defects that he may have. Mr. Gralapp stated that only 17 per cent of our boys and girls go on to college, and it is becoming more and more necessary that vocational training be stressed in our elementary schools, and that there will be great need of junior colleges in all communities.

Pauline Gilmore was program chairman for the day and the club members joined her in expressing appreciation to Mr. Gralapp for his splendid talk.
