Closed Season On Does Asked By Sportsman

LAKEVIEW — James A. Andrews, fish and wildlife representative from Fort Rock, today urged the closing of the doe season, scheduled to open from December 1 to 5.

The illegal slaughter of does in the buck season just closed has been more than enormous, Andrews said. Unless the doe season is closed, there will be a severe shortage of does in the forests.

He went on to say that the killing of does is perhaps as great as the take in bucks this year, at the present time. The does are then left to rot in the forests.

The fish and wildlife man is this week attempting to contact local sportsmen in his plea to stop doe season before the wild life becomes extinct.

MARYSVILLE, Calif., Nov. 13 (AP)—Former major league baseball star due for military discharge will begin parading through Camp Beale today.

Sailors Beat Los Angeles Pro Outfit

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13 (AP)—Fleet City's undefeated record had lost none of its lustre today after the powerful navy Bluejackets from nearby Camp Shoemaker demonstrated their football to the satisfaction of 20,000 fans in beating the Los Angeles Broncos, an independent pro outfit, 41-6 at Kezar stadium yesterday.

The game was featured by two of the longest touchdown runs of the year in this region. In the second period Steve Juzwik, former Notre Dame backfield star, received a Bronco kickoff on his own seven-yard stripe and raced all the way to the end zone.

Buddy Young, Bluejacket left half and ex-national sprint champion from the University of Illinois, took the ball from scrimmage in the third quarter on his own 20 and dodged through the entire field for an 80-yard touchdown ramble.

Over 5 Million Cash Customers See Major Ball

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (AP)—Less than a year ago the major leagues wondered if it would be possible to complete another wartime baseball schedule.

They did it. Not only did they finish out the schedule and a sizzling world series, but in the American league they set a new all-time record of 5,580,420 cash customers for the season.

Those figures were revealed yesterday by League President Will Harridge and reflected an increase of 782,282 over the 1944 mark. They exceeded by 146,629 the former record of 5,433,791 set in 1940.

Another red-hot race, with Detroit winning, was given by Harridge as the probable reason for the record attendance. Detroit headed the list of clubs in total attendance with a new mark of 1,280,341 customers, a new record for Briggs Stadium and 357,165 more than last year's total.
