

# Japanese Face Crushing Cost Of Pacific War

TOKYO, Nov. 13 (AP)—President Truman's reparations representative, Edwin S. Pauley, reached Tokyo tonight and announced "I want a couple of days to size up the situation before making any definite statements" about the reparations bill defeated Japan will be asked to pay.

"I expect to have things well in hand before I leave," he added, but he gave no indication how long he expects to remain. He arrived in a private plane with Navy Undersecretary Artemus L. Gates.

Seventeen members of the reparations commission began

preliminary discussions with officers of General MacArthur's staff here November 9, and Pauley's arrival signalled the start of official deliberations.

Another crushing reminder of the cost of war was brought home to Japanese by forecasts of taxes five times higher than current levies—despite a halved budget. Both points were contained in a recommendation given the finance ministry by the semi-official postwar currency council.

### Sharp Warning

The newspaper Yomiuri Hoichi, reporting the sharp warning, said that the council had been charged with preparation of a five-year program to stabilize currency—already ballooned by a mushrooming black market. The council recommended a 1946-47 budget of not more than 15,000,000,000 yen, non-military items of the present 11,434,000,000 budget are twice the proposed 1946-47 total. Current tax revenues of 14,000,000,000 yen should be boosted to 70,000,000,000, the council was quoted as urging.

Indicating smoothness of his occupation program in spite of signs of restlessness among the Japanese, General MacArthur today announced consolidation of his two armies in Japan into one force under Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger.

### Sixth Army to Leave

The sixth army, presently under command of Gen. Walter P. Krueger with headquarters at Kyoto, will be deactivated January 26 and its personnel not eligible to return home will be transferred to Eichelberger's eighth army command.

January 26 is the birthday of both MacArthur and Krueger and is the third anniversary of the sixth army's formation.

Allied headquarters directed the Japanese government to say by December 15 what it is doing to provide the empire's 70,000,000 people with enough to eat. It further ordered by December 31 a long range program for Japanese agriculture, including a report on such questions as farm indebtedness, taxes, credit and production.

Meanwhile Emperor Hirohito, whom Japanese communists said yesterday should be named Japan's No. 1 war criminal, read a report on the end of the war to his ancestors at Ise shrine. He prayed that "the unprecedented crisis facing the nation would be conquered and the task of constructing a peaceful nation accomplished."

The emperor is scheduled to visit tomorrow morning the Unbeil mausoleum where remains of the Emperor Jimmu—Japan's first ruler—supposedly are interred, and tomorrow afternoon the Momoyama mausoleum where Emperor Meiji was buried.

### U. S. Forestry Service Slash Camp Closed

The U. S. forestry service slash camp at Scott creek was closed Friday for the season, and the road maintenance crew working north to Fort Klamath ceased operation due to weather conditions. Road equipment has been moved to Medford for the winter.

Forestry men are now concentrating on timber marking at the Pelican guard station, where a four-man crew is marking timber on the Finney Logging company sale. This work will continue as long as weather permits, John Sarginson, district ranger, stated.

## Fortunate Klamathites Live Off Best Of Land

A group of boys at one of the Klamath Falls elementary schools comparing lunches recently found one had brought half a roast duck, another pheasant sandwiches and another venison sandwiches. Wild plum and chokecherry jelly sandwiches were brought out for dessert.

Klamathites live off the land to a large extent throughout the year, fishing in the beautiful mountain streams and lakes, stalking deer through the autumn woods, and lying in wait in the tules for wild migratory fowl just before the snow flies.

Blueberries, huckleberries,

gooseberries, plums and chokecherries are gathered for jams, jellies and preserves and for home freezing. Most families either have home freezing units or rent freezing lockers where food is stored for use during the long winter months.

Fish, venison, duck and goose are preserved by smoking, salting or plain freezing, as well as canning. Methods of processing food are available in free bulletins at the home demonstration office, in the post office building.

Recipes for broiling, roasting and deep-frying goose and duck, with appropriate stuffings and accompanying jellies are also to be had on request at the office, and Mrs. Winifred K. Gillett, home demonstration agent, or her secretary, Elizabeth Ann Jones, are always happy to answer any queries on preparing wild game.

In dressing wild birds for cooking or freezing, they should be plucked, singed and drawn, and Mrs. Gillett suggests dry-cleaning. Methods of processing in the direction they grow. To remove the down, dip the thoroughly cooled bird in melted paraffin, the paraffin congeals and the down will peel off with it.

Eyebrow Pluckers  
Eyebrow pluckers are extremely handy for removing pin feathers. Mrs. Gillett advises. Tendons from the legs, as well as the feet and head should be removed, also the oil sack above the tail, the gall bladder and the crop, just as in preparing domestic fowl.

Mrs. Gillett advises hunters that a government agreement with Canada makes it illegal to have game birds in their possession more than 20 days after the close of the season. The season for hunting migratory waterfowl in the entire state of Oregon is from October 13 to December 31, according to present ruling.

## BOWLES RAPS PRICE BOOST ON NEW CARS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP) Bitterly denouncing "government pressure," Price Administrator Chester Bowles told congress today he is rejecting demands of automobile dealers for higher retail prices on new cars.

He said government by lobby pressure "is an ominous sign of our times."

Appearing before the house small business committee, the OPA chief estimated members of congress have received more than 5000 telegrams protesting OPA's auto price plans.

Describing this as "the greatest single pressure group operation since OPA was established," Bowles declared:

"Two and one-half years in Washington has made me something of an expert on pressure groups, lobbyists and pressure group tactics. I have been alarmed at the tendency on the part of some to feel that congress and governmental officials should base their decisions, not on the validity of a particular issue, but on the measure of pressure which could be focused at any given point."

"This idea of 'government by pressure' is an ominous sign of our times. It is a threat to the democratic rights of all the articulate, silent, little people of America."

Bowles told the committee, in the presence of hundreds of auto dealers gathered in the house caucus room, that under the OPA price schedules for new automobiles the dealers "are likely to have their best profit year in 1946."
