

Writ Of Habeas Corpus Requested By Defense In Trial Of Yamashita

MANILA, P. I., Nov. 13 (AP)—The stream of prosecution witnesses reciting details of Japanese brutalities in the Philippine islands under command of Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita was interrupted briefly today as a 14-year-old defense witness took the stand.

Bislimino Romero, grandson of Filipino General Artemio Ricarte who allegedly collaborated with the Japanese, told the court that he had never been present when Ricarte and Yamashita, now on trial for his life, had been together.

Educated in Japan, he testified in Japanese. Previously, Jose Galang, a prosecution witness had told of

occasions when young Romero had been present as an interpreter at meetings of Ricarte and Yamashita. The Filipino officer, Galang said, had asked the Nipponese commander to change his order for "death and destruction" of all Filipinos.

"Good Soldier" The boy said he was unaware of the present whereabouts of his grandfather but he had been informed the general died in the mountains. Yamashita he had heard described as "a good soldier" because of his exploits at Singapore.

Meanwhile, it was learned that the Philippine supreme court has asked Lt. Gen. Wilhelm Stryer, commander of United States army forces in the Western Pacific, to show cause why a writ of habeas corpus should not be issued as requested by Yamashita's defense counsel in a move to have the war crimes case quashed.

Testimony on conditions at the Los Banos prison camp concluded as two witnesses told of the extremely meager sanitary facilities there and said that food was so scarce that pigs which normally lived on kitchen scraps starved to death.

A protest over shooting of two American civilian internees as they returned with food they had foraged outside brought a reply from the guards' commandant that he had orders from imperial headquarters in Manila to kill anyone attempting to escape from the camp, the witnesses said.

Not Escaping The prosecution alleged that in both incidents the men were not attempting to escape. Paul Hennessen, an engineer, testified one of the internees, Pat Held, was returning to the area with a sack containing two coconuts. Earlier testimony told of the killing of George Lewis by a Japanese guard, although he was not attempting to escape.

A parade of witnesses also began testimony concerning the alleged killing of more than 7000 civilians in Calamba, Laguna province, early in February.

Here, it was recounted, Japanese soldiers entered civilian res-

idences and took truckloads of men, women and children away to bayonet and burn.

A Filipino boy said he was stabbed seven times after being blindfolded and taken to a room.

Storms Stall Hunt For Missing Planes

PORTLAND, Nov. 13 (AP)—Search for two bombers missing over the northwest since November 1 has been stalled by storms and hazardous flying weather, the army air base reported today.

Officials said any search would be hampered by heavy snowfalls that have covered the rugged mountain region where the wreckage may be hidden and that low temperatures in the higher altitudes may have killed any of the nine crewmen who survived the crash.

Airplanes have been kept at southern Oregon fields since the search was taken up a day after the planes failed to land from a Portland-Tacoma one hour flight.

CHRISTMAS SEALS WILL BE MAILED

Around 8000 Klamath county residents will receive Christmas seals through the mail this year. It was estimated by the Klamath County Public Health association executive committee, at a meeting Friday.

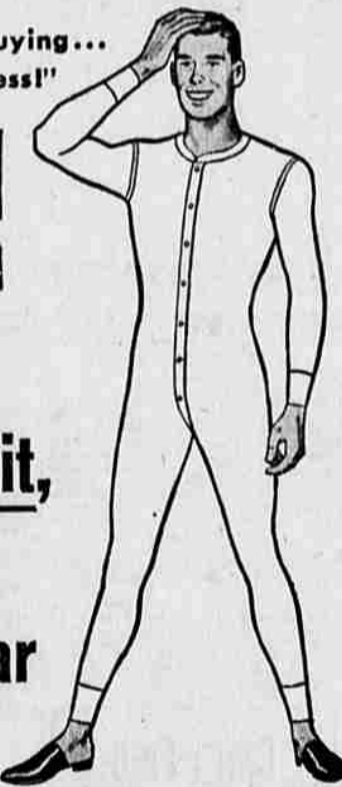
