

'Manassa Mauler' To Appear Here On Victory Bond Show

Featuring Lt. Comdr. Jack Dempsey of the U. S. coast guard, the Victory bond show in connection with the present Victory Loan Bond drive, will get underway at 8 p. m. this Saturday at the Marine Barracks gymnasium.

Two hundred ringside seats are available to buyers of the \$200 Roosevelt Memorial bond. Ringside seat tickets may be obtained by these buyers only at bond headquarters, 1011 Main.

General admission seats number 2500. The purchase of a \$25 bond entitles the buyer to a general admission seat, with tickets available at the time of the bond purchase from the issuing agent.

The entertainment is planned for the enjoyment of people of all ages, featuring a 20-minute show by Dempsey, the marine band, four boxing exhibitions refereed by Dempsey, and a group of singing and dancing acts. The boxing exhibitions include two bouts by marines and two by civilians.

Tickets Good

People who purchased tickets to the football jamboree, which was called off, may turn them in for tickets to the Dempsey show.

Bonds purchased on the payroll deduction plan also entitle the buyer to tickets for this show. The tickets may be obtained from the treasury representatives of the individual firms.

Dempsey and his party will arrive at noon, Saturday. With him will be Ken Martin, executive manager of the Oregon war finance committee.

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1946 LICENSE FEES WITHHELD PENDING STUDY

The city council will withhold the granting of any 1946 licenses pending a study of existing license fees, it was decided at the regular session of the council Tuesday night.

An application presented at last night's meeting brought on a lengthy discussion as to 1946 fees and the council decided to meet Wednesday, tonight, at 7:30 o'clock to study a possible revision of the scale. The motion was made by Councilman Rollin Cantrall and seconded by Councilman Harvey Martin.

The Tuesday session was noticeably calm after last week's stormy session. The boys agreed with the mayor and the mayor agreed with the boys.

Mayor Ed Ostendorf started the meeting off with the appointment of Councilman C. P. Van Doren to the committee posts held by Van Doren's predecessor, J. J. Keller. He will serve on the finance and light and water committees.

The council heard a letter from Representative Lowell Stockman in acknowledgement of a resolution passed by the council October 18, on behalf of a veterans hospital facility in Klamath Falls. Stockman advised the group he felt the veterans administration would give Klamath Falls serious consideration in the 1947 program, but at present he could report nothing approved since the administration is still in the process of justifying the program to the federal board of hospitalization.

Application Denied

An application filed by Joe and Doris Glickman, operators of a service club at 919 Klamath, was denied by the council on recommendation of the police committee.

Mrs. Ruth Berry, city treasurer, asked the council's opinion on destroying old bonds and interest coupons. She suggested redeemed bonds and coupons be kept seven years, samples to be retained and a system devised to destroy the remainder. This matter was referred to the police judge, president of the council and the mayor.

Properly owners on Van Ness avenue will be advised by letter from the council that they will be permitted to hook up to the city sewer on payment of a \$25 fee. There was quite a bit of discussion on this matter, and some members of the council felt that no fee should be asked in view of the fact the residents might later be asked to contribute on the establishment of a sewer district.

Hook-Up Fee

Councilman Landry said he "wanted to be fair to the Van Ness property owners" and asked if a fee would be paid could the owners be given credit if a district should be created. City Engineer Thomas said he felt that a small hook-up fee should be asked and these residents would then be aiding the other property owners who have carried the original burden.

The city authorized the sale of property to Alfred D. Collier including lot 14, block 40, Hillside, \$150 cash, and lot 4, block 42, Hillside, \$75 cash. Members heard the third and
