

Jews Strike In Protest Of New British Policy

JERUSALEM, Nov. 14 (AP)—A 12-hour general Jewish strike in protest to new British proposals for settling the Palestine problem started at noon today without incident.

All Jewish shops, restaurants, work shops and factories were closed and Jewish-operated buses and taxis stopped.

Jewish workers in essential services were requested to continue work in military camps, hospitals, postoffices, telegraph

and broadcasting stations as well as at the El Aviv harbor, where the first cargo ship to arrive since 1940 began discharging merchandise.

The people of Palestine eagerly were studying British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin's statement. A number of mass meetings were planned in Palestine towns during the afternoon.

There was widespread objection throughout Palestine to the statement of British Foreign Secretary Bevin that Britain and the United States jointly would attempt to solve the problem, and to his intimation that eventually Palestine would be placed under a trusteeship, Britain at present governs Palestine under a League of Nations Mandate.

Assembly to Meet
The Jewish elected assembly, made up of representatives of all Palestine political parties, will meet November 19 in Jerusalem to discuss the British statement.

In connection with the general strike of Palestine Jews, it was announced late last night that the self-imposed curfew has been revoked, allowing the possibility of outdoor protest demonstrations. The council (Vaad Leumi) ordered all Jewish working on British government or military enterprises to leave their jobs, and indicated an effort would be made to halt all interurban traffic in the Jewish areas of Palestine.

The Jewish press generally assailed the Bevin statement.

Obstetrical Services Not To Be Available At Tulelake Center

TULELAKE—Obstetrical services will not be made available to Japanese residents of the Tulelake segregation center eligible to relocate after December 15, it is announced by WRA. Expectant mothers who will need hospital and doctor services after that date have been warned that they must make arrangements for such service outside the center.

Jap Baby Dies Of Strangulation

TULELAKE—WRA officials have announced the accidental death of a three and one-half-month-old Japanese baby, child of Mr. and Mrs. Haruyo Kanehiro, residents of the segregation center. The child apparently died of strangulation after falling between a bed and the wall in the family apartment. The death was investigated and reported by internal security officials.

Typical of the comment was that of the Palestine post, which said it failed "to deal squarely with President Truman's repeated proposals that 100,000 Jews should be admitted to Palestine immediately." The newspaper added that the Jews were "bound to reject the new policy which proposes an inacceptable immigration quota subject to Arab consent."

SON REPLACES FATHER IN WAR CRIME TRIALS

NUERNBERG, Nov. 14 (AP)—French and Soviet prosecutors reversed themselves today and voted in favor of a United States proposal to substitute Alfred Krupp for his father, ailing Gustav Krupp von Bohlen and Balbach, as a defendant in the forthcoming war crimes trials.

At the same time Justice Robert H. Jackson, U. S. prosecutor, recommended a 12-day postponement of the trials until December 2. The trials are scheduled to open November 20. The motions were heard today in the first public session of the court. The court adjourned after a hearing of almost two hours without fixing a definite date for another session.

The Krupp family attorney, who pleaded for dismissal of the case against the 75-year-old armament king, served notice that substitution of Alfred as a defendant would lead to a defense request for a 30-day delay between filing of the indictment and opening of the trial.

The British prosecutor, Sir David Maxwell Fyfe, has opposed the substitution, holding that the older Krupp should be tried in absentia. He also opposed any delay in the opening of the trials.

The French and Soviet decl-

sion came after a unanimous report from a medical commission that the aged Krupp had "senile softening of the brain" and would never be able to face trial. He is believed near death.

Motion Filed
Jackson filed a motion with the international military tribunal yesterday, requesting that Alfred, who took over active management of the huge Krupp arsenal empire in 1943, be tried in place of his father. He is under arrest by the British.

Jackson argued that the evidence against Gustav Krupp was identical with that available against the son, adding that only the briefest delay would be necessary. The British prosecutor countered that even if the son were to be substituted for his father, there should be no delay.

Belton said he is not yet ready to announce his decision, as he wants more time to study the case.

Prison Warden George Alexander said Dennis shows no

signs of nervousness, and that he is eating well. Dennis has had no visitors.
