KLAMATH YOUTH ENLISTS IN ARMY

Wendell Earl Dyer, 17, of Klamath Falls, has enlisted in the U. S. army for a period of three years. By signing up for this length of service he has been given a choice of branch of service and theater of operations. He has chosen the air corps in the United States.

Dyer, whose two brothers, Donald and Harlan, are in the army, enlisted through the local army recruiting office under Commanding Officer Major John M. Clayton Jr. He is the eighth man to be sent in through this office during the past month.

Maj. Clayton reminds discharged veterans who are considering re-enlistments, that November 21 is the deadline for retaining present rank on re-enlistments, for men discharged between May 12 and November 1, 1945. If these men re-enlist after the 21st, they will go in again as privates. Men discharged after this date, who re-enlist within 20 days of release,

will retain their rate or rank. This condition will be extended until February 1, 1946, after which new conditions of re-enlistment will be announced.

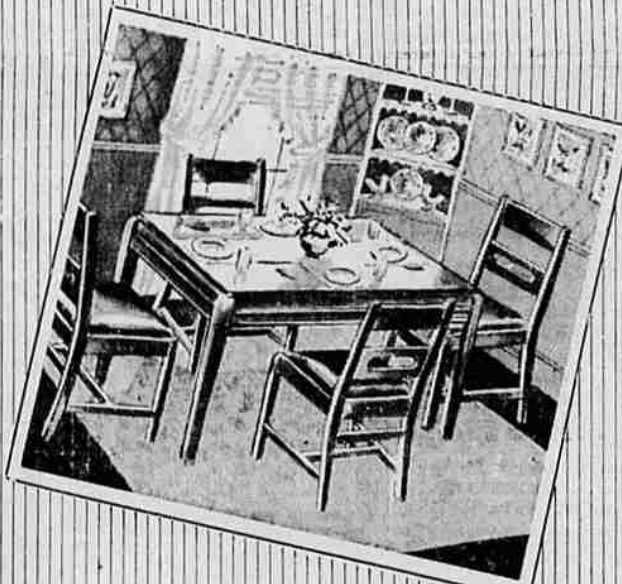

WEATHERMAN SAYS RAIN AND SNOW

Light rain and snow flurries forecast for tonight and Thursday dampened the belief of many old timers that Indian summer would return to the Klamath basin, before Old Man Winter closed in. The highway commission said today that hard rains at all

mountain passes have started to clear the snow away, although slush and packed snow still make it necessary to use chains. Temperature was reported to be 33 degrees this morning at Santiam junction and Odell lake, with hard rainfall, and the same condition was reported at other passes. Heavy rain in the McKenzie pass gave snowplow crews hope they might succeed in their attempts to reopen the pass which has been closed by heavy snowdrifts since last Saturday. If the rain continues, the commission stated, the pass will be opened in a few days, although there is a possibility that the pass might remain closed for the rest of the winter.
