

HONOLULU, Nov. 14 (AP)—Strengthened civilian and naval police kept close watch today on the violence-marked vicinity of the naval air station (NAS) on Honolulu's outskirts. An NAS spokesman blamed city police and city police blamed the navy for Monday night's rioting in which 1500 navy men tangled with civilians.

City patrolmen joined shore patrolmen last night to forestall any further violence, after sailors confined to the station began to crowd around its gates. The combined force broke up the crowd without disorder. Shore patrolmen said they had asked help "in case the sailors tried to leave the station. There

has been no indication how long they may be restricted.

Monday night's disorders at nearby Damon (civilian) housing tract would not have occurred, Honolulu Police Chief William A. Gabrielson asserted, if navy officers had cooperated "the way they should."

Detective Captain Eugene Kennedy also contended that "Navy officers knew there was going to be a disturbance at the Damon tract (civilian housing area near the air station) and did not give us advance information."

Kennedy said the navy personnel went on a three-hour rampage because they were enraged by a false rumor that Damon civilians had killed two sailors.

Several of the 50 navy officers and men explained, Kennedy added, that they were angry "because we are damned sick and tired of seeing our buddies get beaten by local toughies and not a damned thing is done about it."

Lt. R. M. Singer, NAS public

information officer, blamed the police for the disturbance. He charged that more than 35 NAS personnel were beaten by civilians in the past two months, but that the police made no arrests.

Gabrielson countered "It is an absolute falsehood when the police are charged with not cooperating."

Kennedy said the navy personnel were armed with clubs, knives and rocks. Two automobiles were overturned, a motorcycle battered and windows smashed. However, Kennedy said there were no serious injuries.

A spectator, 75-year-old Joseph Gutheridge, died of a heart attack.

Fifty navy men were detained and later turned over to naval authorities for discipline.

Kennedy said he and Gabrielson agreed, after a conference with the 14th naval district commandant, to increase civil police protection at Damon tract until the navy is able to handle the situation.

Detective Neil Donahue said that Lt. Blair Coleman, NAS junior officer of the day—the only one of the 50 detained men named—was held because he was "heard to encourage the rioters."

However, Singer stated that Coleman "was just trying to help quiet the men and send them back to their base."

JAP SLAYING SET FOR JANUARY TERM

ONTARIO, Ore., Nov. 14 (AP)—The first degree murder case against Floyd Pousson, 17, Lake Charles, La., charged with slaying Natsuji Kurisu, 61-year-old Nisei, probably will not be called until the January grand jury session, District Attorney E. Otis Smith said today.

Pousson was bound over to the grand jury after preliminary hearings before Justice Thomas Jones. Although the youth made no statement, Smith said

he appeared shaken by the proceedings.

Smith filed a complaint October 19 charging Pousson with the killing. The body of Kurisu, missing 11 days, was found north of here October 15.

Testimony at the hearings indicated the Japanese-American died a violent death, and that his auto and personal effects were found in Pousson's possession upon the youth's arrest in Texas.

Thanksgiving Set November 22

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—President Truman has proclaimed November 22, fourth Thursday of the month, as Thanksgiving Day.

His proclamation asked that "We give thanks with the humility of free men, each knowing it was the might of no one arm but of all together by which we were saved."

BIDS INVITED FOR RECLAMATION JOB

The Coppeck Bay project is now open for bids, it was announced today by the Klamath Falls office of the U. S. bureau of reclamation.

Sealed bids will be received until 10 o'clock the morning of November 30, and then will be publicly opened. Bids are invited for furnishing labor, materials and performing all work for the construction of earth work and structures of canals and drains of Coppeck Bay, Modoc unit, Tule Lake division, Klamath project, Oregon-California.

The work is situated about 30 miles southeast of Klamath Falls.

This invitation for bids does not cover the purchase of materials which are to be furnished by the government. Materials to be furnished by the contractor and those furnished by the government are described in standard forms of the specifications which may be obtained from the U. S. bureau of reclamation, post office building, Klamath Falls.

The work shall be commenced 30 days after the date of receipt of notice to proceed, and the work shall be completed as provided in the specifications.

Democrat Elected Louisville Mayor

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 14 (AP)—The official count of votes for mayor of Louisville was on record today, giving E. Leland Taylor, democrat, a margin of 221 votes over Roy W. Easley, republican, a gain of 16 votes over last Saturday's unofficial count.

The outcome only made republicans more determined than ever to seek a recount, Edward C. Black, republican organization chairman, announced after hearing the report. The party has until Friday midnight to file a recount petition, according to law.

BROAD PROJECTS TO AID WAR VETS EYED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Two broad projects to help war veterans resume peacetime pursuits attracted strong support in congress.

One proposal is to revise the "G. I. Bill of Rights" to simplify loan procedure and liberalize educational benefits. It passed the senate unanimously yesterday. House leaders told a reporter they expected speedy concurrence.

The other plan is to have a federal agency formulate a coordinated national program to help veterans get jobs.

Under identical bills proposed yesterday by six legislators, the war-time restraining and reemployment administration would be devitalized and put to work on the program.

The measure was introduced by Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.) for himself and Senators Edwin C. Johnson (R-Colo.) and Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), and by Reps. Edith Nourse Rogers (R-Mass.) Domengeaux (D-La.) and Savage (D-Wash.)

Meeting Of Oregon Counties Underway
