

Klamath Growers Have 30 Days To Get Potato Loan

Only thirty days remain for Klamath county potato growers to take advantage of the 1945 Irish potato loan offered by the Commodity Credit Corporation, reminded County Agent C. A. Henderson in a statement issued from his offices in the federal building in Klamath Falls today. December 15th is the deadline for making applications for the loans, which are being taken at the AAA offices on the second floor of the post office building, Henderson pointed out.

All loans must be cleared and finally completed by December 31. "If many growers are waiting until the last few days to make applications, it is just possible that all such late applications could not be completed and a loan made by the 31st of December," Henderson stated.

GRANGE MASTER SUGGESTS PLAN FOR SURPLUSES

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 15 (AP)—Albert S. Goss, master of the National Grange, meeting here in its 79th session, today advocated the establishment of a commission to be appointed by the president to handle the problem of possible post-war agricultural surpluses.

Goss, addressing the delegates at the first day of the meeting, said he would give the commission a "stock of remedies"—broad powers to handle surplus crops, when conditions warranted. He recommended the proposed commission be given power to stabilize the market for any commodity at or near to parity as may be possible "without creating unmanageable surpluses."

In addition to the creation of the commission, the head of the nation's largest farm organization, also offered the following four points to aid in the solving of the "farm problem":

Parity Formula
A new, equitable parity formula, broadening of the market agreements acts so as to cover most commodities, expanded vocational education service, and incentive payments for emergency treatments of needed large shifts in cotton production.

In proposing a remedy for crops in surpluses, he divided commodities into groups—"domestic crops," those normally having no unmanageable surplus; "surplus crops," those with frequent or chronic surpluses; and "borderline cases."

He said relief for domestic crops can be found through cooperative marketing where no adequate machinery is available; the marketing agreement acts, where cooperative marketing is not practicable; and price supports through guarantees or non-recourse loans.

In borderline and surplus crops, he recommended "compensatory price levels could be maintained on the domestic portion of the crop through cooperative marketing, marketing agreements or supports, if the surplus could be sold."

Goss recommended a modernized "parity formula" which would take into consideration the farmers' labor and the "changing demands between commodities," thus indicating an equitable exchange value between the products of agriculture, labor, industry, and other groups.

"The immediate danger of a collapse in farm prices would be mitigated by existing law if we had a reasonable parity formula," he added, "but with our obsolete formula a number of major commodities have little or no protection."

Referring to labor, the grange master said he favored a sound minimum wage law which "should not be mixed up with a lot of dangerous centralized controls," and pointed out that "no lasting solution to the labor problem can be obtained by force."

The one general course "to pursue in our present inflation crisis," he said, is to "hold ceiling

concerned, the only support available at the present time is through this loan. At the present time, growers who do not have loans or applications for loans by December 15th are not eligible for the support prices in case the market, after that loan closing date, deteriorates."

Practice Program Of AAA To Be Talked

Farmers attending the AAA community election meetings will learn about the 1948 agricultural conservation program, which has just been approved for Oregon. They'll also have a chance to discuss the program and to advise the county committee on the practices that should be offered in their county. With practice payments limited by county allocations, committee members will have to decide on the practices most needed to meet local conservation needs.

Practice Reports Due Before January 15

January 15, 1946 has been set as the last day for reporting performance of practices under the 1945 agricultural conservation program. To be eligible for payment, practices must be completed before December 31, 1945, and reported to the county office before January 15.

In reporting performance, farmers are asked to bring with them to the county office sales slips for other evidence showing kind and amount of lime, phosphate and sulphur, chemical weed control.

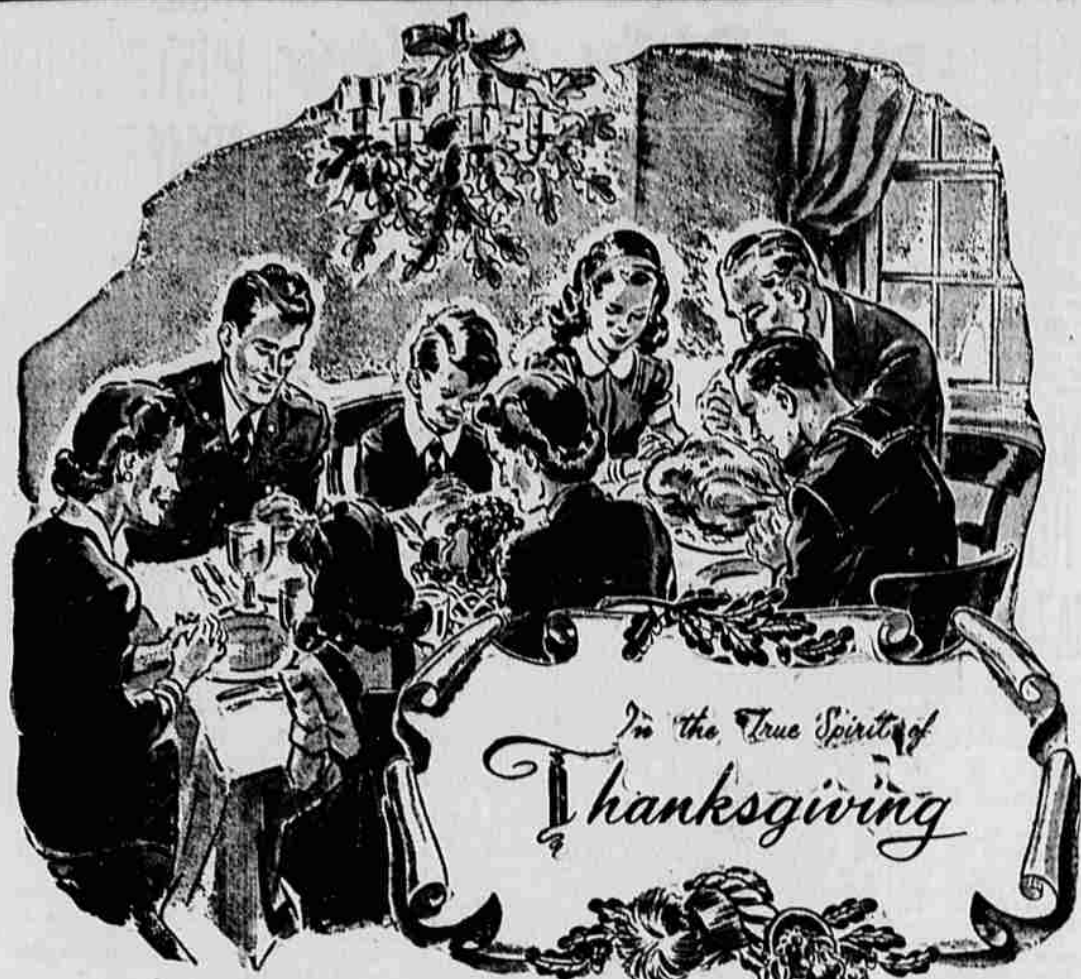
