Four young men of this church have given their lives in service of their country during World War II. They include Mr. Hertager, Robert Schultz, Olin Brooks and Don Newsum.

ST. PAUL'S WILL HONOR WISSENBACH

Twenty-five years of romance, drama and adventure as a priest of the Episcopal church will be marked November 18 when members of St. Paul's church unite in honoring the Rev. F. C. Wissenbach at a silver-anniversary celebration.

A reception will be held in the parish hall on this date between 7 and 9 o'clock in the evening honoring the Rev. and Mrs. Wissenbach, who are also celebrating their silver-wedding anniversary, this November.

Married

The Rev. Mr. Wissenbach was married a week after he was ordained as a priest, in Rawlins, Wyo., and he was there in the church for 16 years. It was there his two daughters were born. He had already served for one year as a deacon of the church when he was ordained. In 1936, he was sent to Munich, Germany to take over the rectorship in the church.

He was born in Barnstadt, Hessen, and educated in France and Germany before he came to the United States and entered the theological seminary in Virginia, preparatory to going into the ministry.

Times Precarious

Germany was under Hitler rule during the three years he spent in Munich, and times were pretty precarious for his family and his 1200 American and British parishioners. The book he may write some day, should be a chilling epoch of Hitler's persecution of the Jews, seen at first hand by the minister. The church library containing 20,000 books, was a focal point of Anglo-Saxon social life in Bavaria, and the minister was an unofficial representative of the United States. This drew Hitler's attention and his ire. Telephone lines were tapped, mail was held up and tampered with, salary checks from home confiscated.

A job was offered the American to work with the Nazi national socialist government in the United States. This offer was emphatically rejected and the minister continued to preach against Nazi persecution policies, which irked the fuhrer more. It finally became necessary to leave the country and this was effected by purchasing tickets through Austria, shipping personal belongings through Hamburg, and coming out themselves through Belgium.

Not until they were aboard the ship en route home were they sure they had eluded pursuit.

The Rev. Mr. Wissenbach served several years in the church in Pendleton, Ore., upon his return to this country, until he transferred to St. Paul's parish at Klamath Falls, where he has been for the past three years.

Church Of Nazarene Will Hold Evangelistic Program

"Wonders of the Earth, Sky and Air" will be the theme of the evangelistic services to be held at the Church of the Nazarene, Garden and Martin, each evening at 7:30 o'clock starting November 20 through November 25.

Ernest Linwood Hawkes of Los Angeles, evangelist, traveler and student of science and astronomy, will conduct the services with projected illustrations on a 12-foot screen.

Amazing pictures of the heavens, made by the world's largest telescope, a 101-inch Hooker, will be shown, making the moon appear as though it were less than 100 miles away, instead of the true distance of 238,000 miles. The solar corona, sun

spots, geysers of flame shooting from the sun, may be seen; Mars and its polar ice caps; Jupiter and its moons; Saturn with its rings; spiral and planetary nebulae, star clusters, and many other astronomical phenomena.

A fine display of fluorescent rocks transformed by ultraviolet rays will be shown. "Dry rainbows," magic eye, photo-electric cell, sound recording and reproduction will also be shown by the evangelist as the series of meetings, to illustrate his religious message. Mr. Hawkes refers to his presentation as the "old-fashioned religion in new attire."

Bertrand F. Peterson, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, welcomes everyone in Klamath area to view these wonders and enjoy the services.

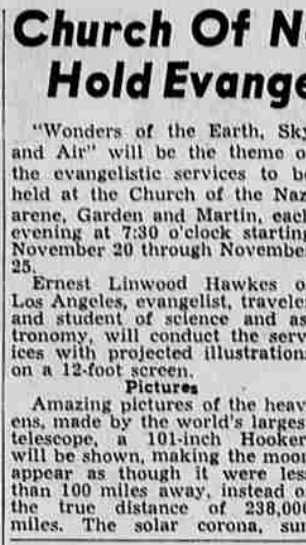

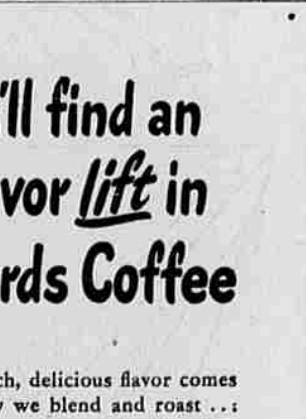

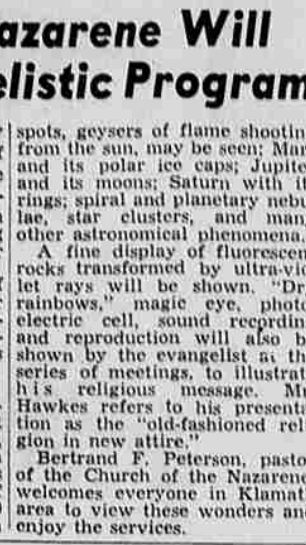

Memorial Services To Be Held For Victor Hertager

Memorial services for Victor Hertager will be held at Klamath Lutheran church Sunday at 11 a. m. The Rev. S. M. Toppness will deliver the sermon and the American Legion will present a flag to the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Heine Hertager of Prospect, Ore.

PFC Victor Hertager was born in Klamath Falls November 13, 1925. He enlisted in the United States marine air corps February 15, 1943 and was sent overseas July 15, 1943 for further training. He was assigned to a squadron, VMF-232, and took part in several major operations in the South Pacific. He was reported missing on January 17, 1944, when the plane he was in crashed in Simpson harbor at Rabaul, and was declared dead by the navy department January 18, 1945.

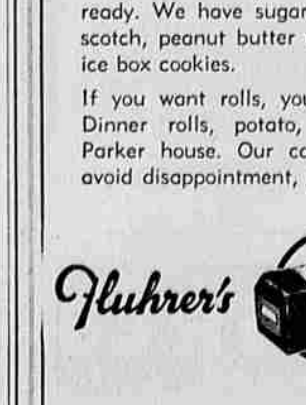
