THERE IS A new development in France.

De Gaulle, unanimously chosen interim president yesterday by the new French constituent assembly, resigns today when he fails to "compromise differences" with the French communist party. The communists, the dispatches report, had set as their price for participation in a coalition government the appointment of a communist as one of the "big three" ministers (foreign affairs, interior or war).

There is a later dispatch to the effect that FRANTIC negotiations to prevent De Gaulle's resignation are under way in Paris. Who is doing the frantic negotiating isn't stated in the dispatch.

The communists are the strongest of three parties represented in the new French constituent assembly, but are outnumbered by the other two. It is obvious that they are making a play for all the power they can get.

The Californian asked Thielen if he knew whether any orders had been issued at Pearl Harbor or in Washington directing American forces not to fire on Japanese vessels or installations until fired upon.

"Don't you know that such an order was issued to General MacArthur?" Gearhart asked.

Thielen said he had no knowledge of it.

"Is that the reason they have you people come up here to read hearsay testimony to us so that when we ask you a question you can answer that you don't know?" demanded Gearhart.

Chairman Barkley (D-Ky.) broke in to object that the committee had agreed to receive a narrative account of the actual Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Start Shouting
Republicans immediately started shouting into the microphones before them.

Gearhart said he never agreed to any such thing. Senators Ferguson and Brewster (R-Me.) said they hadn't either.

Barkley insisted that the method had been agreed upon previously and republicans had not objected then.

In a series of questions, Gearhart attempted to develop what he said was the significance of orders to turn off the Oahu radar machines at 7 a. m. He noted that the attacking Japanese planes flew into the scope of one of the machines still operating at 7:02 a. m.

"Don't you think it was possible somebody was exerting a tremendous influence over the writing of orders either in the headquarters in Honolulu or headquarters in the United States?" he asked the witness.

Thielen said he didn't know anything about that.

Third Labor Union Eyed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Talk of the formation of a third labor federation, embracing unions independent of the CIO and AFL, was heard today at the labor-management conference.

John L. Lewis, chief of the United Mine Workers, was suggested as leader of the projected organization.

Lewis himself told reporters, "It's one of the matters to be considered along with all other things affecting the future."

Walter W. Cenerazzo, of the American Watch Makers union, discussed with Lewis the possible formation of such a group and Joseph Beirne, president of the National Federation of Telephone Workers, told reporters that "Lewis or somebody must do the job."

Industry Stand
Industry delegates to the conference promised to reveal today their stand on the collective bargaining issue.

Indications were it might take the form of a counter proposal or amendment to a request by CIO President Philip Murray that the conference approve bargaining within the framework of the administration's broad wage-price policy; raise wages generally without increasing prices.

Ira Mosher, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, told newsmen management's "100 per cent" view would be presented to the conference executive committee at its closed meeting today (noon).

Missing Heir Not Sure He Wants Legacy Of \$28,000

PORTLAND, Nov. 16 (AP)—A missing heir, whose twin sister has been paging him through eastern Oregon, said today he wasn't sure he wanted that \$28,000 legacy after all.

Frederick Edward Souza, 43-year-old merchant seaman, saw a newspaper story explaining

that his sister, Mrs. Frank J. Galvin, San Francisco, was seeking him with his parents' bequest. "I got to have time to think this over," he said. "I'm all confused."

It was from the newspaper he learned that his parents died two years ago and that his five brothers had been killed in action. "This has hit me," he said. "I called my sister, and she's holding that money safe for me until I get this all figured out. I'm going home for Christmas this year to see her."

Souza, who disappeared into eastern Oregon to regain his health, said he'd been living at Prairie City, "where there are real people."

"Jennie?" he said, when asked about the girl whom he'd told his brother-in-law he was going to eastern Oregon to marry. "Ah, she turned me down." He opened his billfold to a faded picture.

for the test yesterday with their proposal that the United Nations organization create a special commission on atomic energy.

Russia's reaction may either be made known quickly or withheld until the United Nations holds its organization meeting at London during the first week in January.

That is where the issue will have to come to a head.

Meanwhile, the world probably will learn something more about American thinking on the subject tonight from Secretary of State Byrnes. The state department said he would devote part of his speech to the three-power declaration when he appears at a testimonial dinner in Charleston, S. C., (5 p. m. PST NBC).

The job for the United Nations presumably will be proposed formally by the United States as soon as the security council is organized.

While no details have been disclosed officially, it is expected by officials here that the proposed atomic commission will be set up under the security council and that it will include as members America, Britain, Russia, France and China. Those are the five permanent members of the council.

Indonesia Revolt Said Slackening

BATAVIA, Nov. 16 (AP)—Hubertus J. van Mook, acting governor general of The Netherlands East Indies, called upon the Indonesian nationalist cabinet tonight to meet him in an informal discussion at the earliest possible moment, in an effort to save Indonesia from further bloodshed and threatened famine.

Van Mook made his statement at a press conference at a time when Indonesian resistance was officially reported to be slackening at battered Soerabaja before the assault of tanks, guns and planes of the slowly advancing British Indian troops.

The acting governor general expressed disappointment that the Indonesians had been unable to attend a meeting last night under the chairmanship of Lt. Gen. Sir Philip Christison, allied commander in the NeI, and said it was imperative in the interests of Indonesia as a whole that both sides cooperate to keep order and prevent the economic ruin of Java.

Wedemeyer said that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek and Gen. Chou En-lai, communist leader in Chungking, had been informed of the exchange of messages.

Marines Return Fire
Associated Press Correspondent Olen Clements, at Tientsin, said travelers reported the marines aboard the train returned the fire, but marine headquarters remained silent.

"Travelers said that the fight took place at a spot between Tangshan and Chinwangtao, where communist troops have been giving the nationalists trouble for days," Clements reported. He said it was not known whether communists knew General Peck was aboard the train.

This is not the first time marines have been fired on while riding north China's trains, but the shots thus far have been scattered. Only one marine has been reported wounded seriously.
