Klamath County Lags Far Behind In Victory Loan

Klamath Falls needed a little of that something they put in the atomic bomb to make it wake up to the responsibilities of the Victory Loan, it was the opinion of a hard working committee today.

Money was not coming into bond headquarters the way it should and Klamath county held 35th place in the state. There are only 36 places, the committee pointed out. Other sections of Oregon, without the envied record of Klamath county, are putting this community to shame and Hood River, following General Jonathan Wainwright's visit there yesterday, responded with an over-the-top subscription to the E Bond quota.

Service clubs in Klamath Falls have undertaken the job of raising the Victory Loan quota of \$1,940,000, of which \$740,000 is in E bonds. This is the way the E bond campaign has been going, and the percentage of the quota raised:

Percentage Raised
Business and Professional Women's club, \$15,000 raised, 17 per cent of the quota; Kiwanis, \$40,000, 16 per cent; Lions, \$20,000, 13 per cent; Rotary, \$25,000, 8 per cent; Junior chamber of commerce, \$7000, 3 per cent. The Soroptimist club has no quota as this group is

handling publicity of the campaign but at the Thursday noon luncheon, members subscribed to \$11,775 in bonds. City schools reported the purchase of \$5700; Sacred Heart academy, \$1275. Sales will continue weekly throughout the drive. Chiloquin school over-subscribed in the county and Mills school in Klamath Falls went over-the-top the first day. Teams headed by Paula Alberts and Remo Minato were competing in the bond sales contest sponsored by the Chiloquin committees.

Klamath has time to pull itself up among the top three in the state and bond headquarters at 1011 Main is available to all. It was hoped that weekend shoppers would "buy a bond" Saturday.
