

Medford Dons District Gridiron Crown

Tornado Will Play Grant In State Semi-Final Tilt Thanksgiving

Medford and Hood River donned their official crowns in the Oregon prep gridiron race today—and Medford's, amazingly, was just a trifle dented.

The Medford Black Tornado which has won every game for two seasons and piled up an aggregate of 452 points in eight tilts this year to opponents' 7, downed unbeaten North Bend in the district 2 playoff last night.

But the rugged Loggers held the score to 26-13—the narrowest margin of victory for Medford this season—and became the second school to score upon the powerful Tornado.

Except for two first-half Med-

ford touchdowns, the teams played on fairly even terms. Bob Watson dashed 56 yards for the first Medford tally and went over from the 9-yard line for the second, after a push starting on Medford's 31.

North Bend recovered a fumble on the Medford 33 and drove to the 3, where Conrad Hagen passed to Garland Fry for a third-quarter touchdown. Jerry Clark retaliated for Medford, making the score 20-6, when he scored from the one.

North Bend then tallied on Bob Sanders' touchdown, after his 52-yard pass to Hagen on the 15-yard line. Clark scored the final counter for Medford from the four. The final: 26-13.

Hood River, only undefeated squad in district 1, lived up to expectations by blanking Vale, Snake River champion, 41-0, to capture the official crown.

Medford, heavy favorite to take the state championship again this season, will battle Grant, the already chosen district 4 champ, on Thanksgiving Day in the state semi-finals.

The other semi-final will pit Hood River against the district 3 titlist—either McMinnville or Cottage Grove, who play off at Cottage Grove today for the crown.

Moro and Reedsport climbed into the finale of Oregon's small school football play, and will collide for the "B" championship Thanksgiving Day.

Moro edged Enterprise, 7-6. In the eastern Oregon semi-final last night, Reedsport, perennial small-school powerhouse, steam-rolled Taft, 30-0. In the western Oregon semi-final.

Henley Beats Malin For County Belt

The Henley Hornets clinched the county football championship yesterday afternoon by defeating Malin's Mustangs 27-2 yesterday afternoon at Malin.

Fred Hess scored in the first quarter on a six-yard line buck and then went through center again for the extra point. Taking the ball on the kickoff, Malin made its most determined scoring effort of the afternoon by marching down the field to the Henley six.

There the Hornet line held and that ended the scoring for the first half.

In the third quarter a series of line plays gave Henley another touchdown and again Malin threatened but was unable to score.

A 45-yard gallop around end by Calvin Noble gave the Hornets their third score and Albert Thexton plunged through center for the extra unit, making the count 20-0.

In the fourth canto a long pass from Hess to Adams scored again for Henley. Adams went around end for the conversion.

Malin got a two-point safety in the fourth period when Hess dropped back behind his own goal to pass, couldn't locate a receiver and was smeared.

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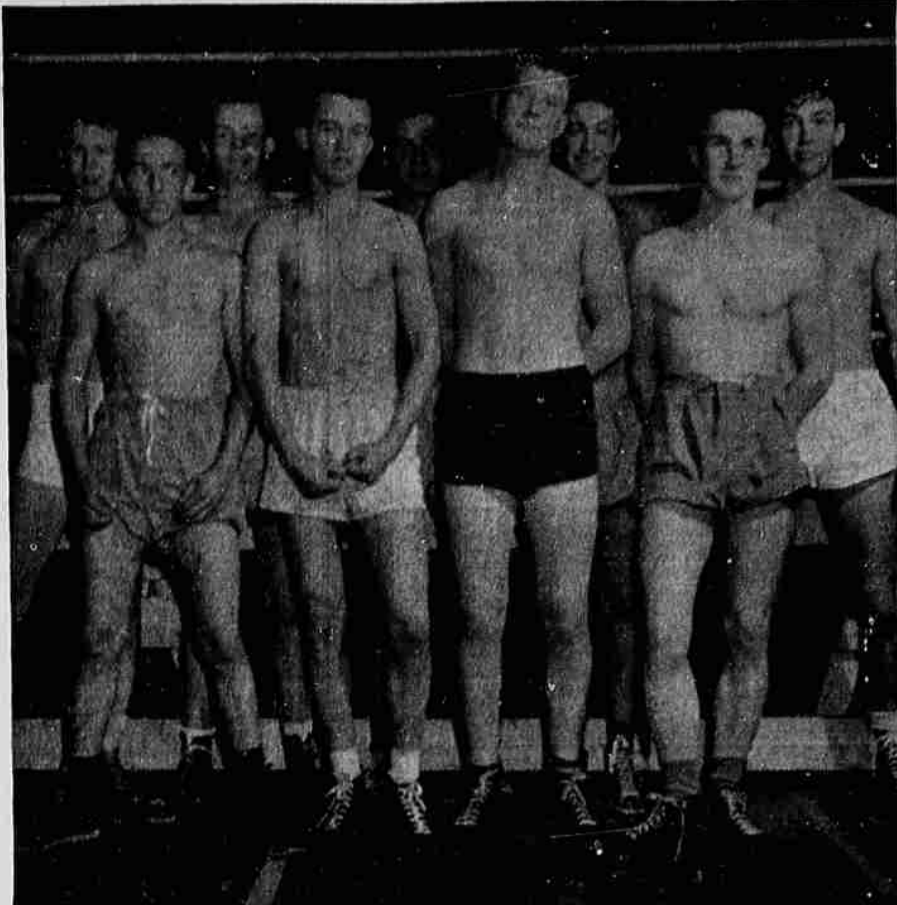

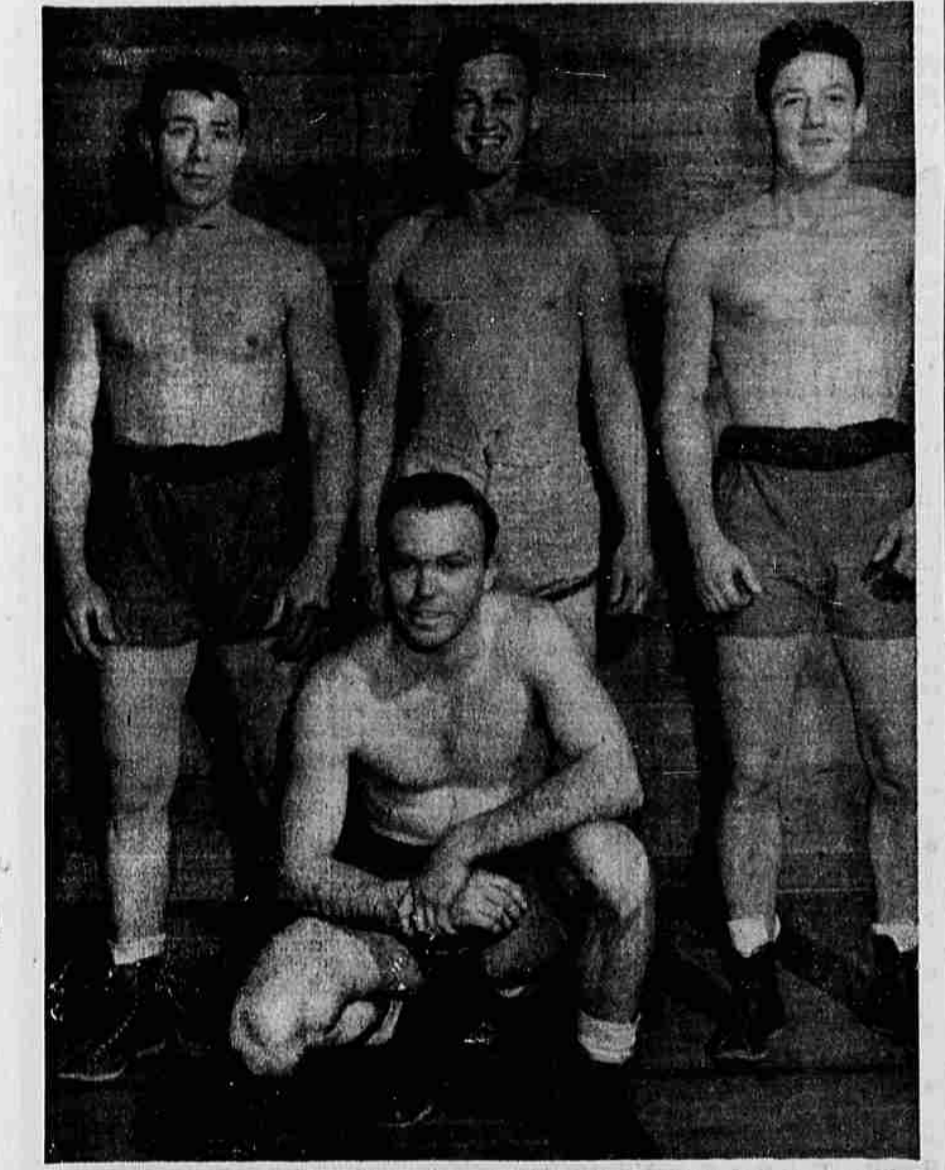
