IMMUNIZATION OF CHILDREN FINISHED

Immunization of children against diphtheria and smallpox, is now completed in the Klamath county school system. Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, public health officer, announced today.

First diphtheria shots and all smallpox shots have been given in the city schools, in accordance with the health program, and second diphtheria shots will be started Monday at Fairview school.

These shots are administered three weeks after the first shots are given. Children who were vaccinated five and six years ago will be vaccinated again, as immunization is usually void after this length of time, Dr. Rozendal stated.

belief that all of the convicted would be executed.

The British military court convicted Kramer, the ex-commandant known as the "beast of Belsen," and 29 of his aides and guards at the end of the nine-week trial yesterday.

Others to be hanged were: Peter Weingartner, 32, former member of the Yugoslav army.

Karl Franchois, 33, SS guard and former Silesian coal miner.

Wilhelm Dorr, 24, SS guard and a farmer's son.

Eric Zoddell, 32-year-old camp functionary who formerly was a Berlin milk man, was sentenced to life imprisonment for his part in the regime of brutalities and starvation which cost thousands of lives among internees.

Fifteen-year sentences were drawn by: Hertha Ehlert, 40, SS guard and former bakery saleswoman in Berlin.

HAMILTON ISSUES SAFETY WARNING

Poultry Processing Plant Inspection Will Be Voluntary
WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (P) Inspection of poultry processing plants will be continued on a purely voluntary basis, says acting Agriculture Secretary J. B. Hutson.

Hutson wrote Senator Morse (R-Ore.) that he understood interest had been expressed by the National Poultry Canners' Institute in legislation looking toward compulsory federal inspection but he added:

"I know of no organized program for development of legislation for compulsory inspection of canning plants."
Federal inspection is used by poultry packers in the eastern states but western plants are operated under local and state health codes, Hutson said in reply.
