He has taught in the College of the City of New York, Lafayette college, Northwestern university, Albany college, Multnomah college, Hill Military academy, Grant, Roosevelt and Lincoln high schools in Portland.

In addition, Mr. Prillaman has taught public speaking to more than 3000 businessmen and women, and for the past eight years has been a teacher of speech and debate to the American Institute of Bankers at Portland.

He has traveled in every state of the Union, Mexico, Canada, Alaska and Europe. For two years he served as editor and lecturer for Binford and Mort, Portland publishers. He is known as a frank and forceful speaker, and during his appearance here will talk on international relations.
