

FARMERS URGED TO LIST GOOD LAND FOR RENT

Klamath county farmers and landowners with good farms for rent or sale this fall can help returning World War II veterans and other qualified farmers get re-established by listing such places with the farm security administration office, courthouse, Klamath Falls, Ore. The county FSA supervisor, "There are a number of veterans and families with farm background who are eligible for FSA credit and management services if they can find good family-type farms for sale or rent," Lauderdale said. "If these qualified farmers and their families can be set up in the county on a sound basis through FSA help, every community and business will eventually benefit."

Even former residents of the county seem to be having difficulty in locating suitable farms to qualify for farm security assistance, explained Lauderdale. A qualified veteran or farmer can borrow up to \$2500 for livestock, equipment, household goods, and needed operating goods if he can rent or lease a farm for the period of the loan, usually three to five years. Forty-year farm ownership loans bearing three per cent interest can be made for family-type farms for sale on the basis of their long-time earning capacity. County FSA committee members, including John P. Korns, route 3, box 339, Klamath Falls; John A. Short, route 2, box 544, Klamath Falls; Elmer K. Smith, box 174, Chiloquino, and Clifford C. Jenkins, Malin, are working closely with the county FSA office in trying to locate farms and will be glad to take informal listings from farmers or landowners in their communities. There is no obligation in listing farms with FSA as the purpose is entirely to help landless veterans and farm families by putting them in touch with farm owners willing to lease or sell.

OPENING OF ESSAY CONTEST ANNOUNCED

The Oregon Historical society has announced the 28th Oregon history prize essay contest for 1946, which is open to students between 15 and 18 years of age attending any educational institution within the state. The topic for the contest, which ends March 16, 1946, is "The Life and Work of George Abernethy." The four prizes offered are first, \$60; second, \$50; third, \$40; and fourth, \$30. Essays submitted must not exceed 2000 words in length, and must be accompanied by a signed statement by a teacher in the school the student attends, stating that the writer of the essay is a student there. The essays will be judged on general merit and originality, but the judges will also take into consideration the neatness of the manuscript, accurate orthography, correct grammar and composition, and clarity of diction. The essays must be mailed to the Oregon Historical society, public auditorium, 235 S.W. Market street, Portland 1, Oregon.

DISTRICT OPA SETS FOOD ALLOTMENTS

Institutional users—such as restaurants, hotels, and other similar establishments—are now getting their bi-monthly allotments of rationed foods from the Portland OPA district office, rather than from local boards, starting with the November-December periods. Mrs. Marjorie Leo, OPA food rationing representative, announced today. Many applications are now being processed, the shift in handling of institutional users' applications for rationed foods having originally been announced early in the fall.

Mrs. Leo also announced that a special supplemental allotment of shortening and oils will

not be made to industrial users of these ingredients during the fourth quarter as the need for such a special allotment was removed by the reduction of point values.

Harvest Housing Facilities Removed

The camp was located across the Alturas highway from town and this year accommodated one of the heaviest turnovers of harvest labor in years.
