

Bus Travel Heavy Despite Bad Roads

Storms and foul weather do not keep people home, according to Klamath Falls Greyhound bus officials, who say there has been no let-up in bus travel due to weather.

Traffic is still heavy, especially over weekends and holidays, but there is no more standing in lines, and an empty seat or two shows up now and then.

Passengers are easily taken care of as two or three sections have been added to all heavy

schedules, and there are extra buses available now to be added whenever necessary.

Bus service is good, with passengers reaching their destinations only a little behind schedule in spite of ice and snow on the highways. These delays are caused to a large extent by house trailers traveling without chains, that skid crossways on the highways, J. K. Sayre, manager of the local depot stated.

During the four war years service was maintained through-out division 7 of the Greyhound lines, from Redding and from Eureka north to Portland, on highways 97, 99 and 101. Although old re-conditioned buses were used and many new drivers put on, no fatalities occurred involving the company.

The depot at the corner of Klamath avenue and S. 9th street is now being renovated and redecorated, with the interior of the waiting room and restaurant being newly painted. The electric signs will be moved to the corner of the building where it can be seen from all directions.

THREE NAME BANDS TO APPEAR AT POST

Papers Down In Seattle

SEATTLE, Nov. 19 (AP)—Seattle's three daily newspapers were strike bound today as a result of a walkout of members of the Typographical Union (AFL) Local 202 in a demand for increased wages.

The Post-Intelligencer, a morning paper, published one edition last night and then shut down. The two afternoon dailies, The Times and The Star did not publish this morning.

The union members voted to strike at a meeting last night after rejecting management's wage increase proposal. The union sought an increase of \$2.95 per day, from a \$10.35 for a seven-hour day to \$13.30 a day. The counter proposal of the management was for \$8.25 a week increase.

Employees associated with other unions including the Newspaper Guild, The Reporters' organization, refused to pass picket lines and were away from their jobs.

Assembly Backs Gen. De Gaulle

PARIS, Nov. 19 (AP)—The constituent assembly voted 406 to 163 today to ask Gen. De Gaulle to renew his efforts to form a coalition government giving equal representation to the communists, socialists and popular republican parties.

The communists voted as a bloc against renewal of De Gaulle's mandate in an atmosphere bristling with guns and armed guards which surrounded the Bourbon palace where the assembly met.

The vote ended temporarily at least any chance of De Gaulle's resigning as France's interim president, however.

In a last-minute switch of tactics the socialists, who had said they would abstain in the balloting, voted for De Gaulle.

The assembly then adjourned until Thursday.

3 TRANS-CASCADE HIGHWAYS CLOSED

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Klamath Falls early last evening and throughout the night rain fell. It changed to a light snow fall early Monday morning and by noon slush was the only evidence of the storm. Power was off intermittently Sunday afternoon when two Main street circuits wrapped together as a result of the high wind. Up in Portland, failure of electrical equipment kept the Burnside bridge suspended in mid-air most of Sunday afternoon forcing detour of traffic.

High Wind Velocity

The California Oregon Power company reported a wind velocity of 45 miles per hour at 4:45 p. m. Sunday. No property damage was reported. Total precipitation in this immediate area over the past 24 hours was close to one-half inch.

Enough rain fell in Malin last night and early this morning to flood any other country, Joseph Drazio, potato and clover grower in that district reported to County Agent C. A. Henderson.

"The only thing that saved Malin from floating away," Drazio said, "is the sandy soil which absorbs moisture like a sponge. Even so, roads were inundated for a short time when rain fell too hard and fast to soak into the soil."

Tuesday's forecast by the U.S. weatherman was "clearing and colder" and the prospects of a bright Thanksgiving were good. Indications were that the mercury would drop but there would be little snow.

"Bull" Halsey Cancels Visit

Admiral W. F. Halsey's visit to Klamath Falls has been cancelled.

He had been scheduled to visit here Tuesday for a parade and war bond appearance, but for various reasons was unable to arrange the stop.

Victory Loan Chairman Elton Thompson today received the following telegram:

"Lt. Comdr. W. J. Kichel, aide to Admiral Halsey, advised it will be impossible to stop at Klamath Falls en route. Admiral Halsey expresses his regrets."

The telegram was sent by Kenneth G. Martin, state war bond chairman.

Admiral Halsey had previously expressed willingness to stop here especially in view of his friendship with Col. Charles T. Brooks of the Marine Barracks, for a long time a member of his staff.

Truman Will Get Honorary Degree

WACO, Tex., Nov. 19 (AP)—Pat M. Neff, president of Baylor University, said today the Baptist general convention "does not select the persons to whom honorary degrees will be granted" and said Baylor would grant such a degree to President Truman.

A post mortem will be held here to determine whether or not the child was alive at the time it was placed in the outhouse.

Klamath county was \$600,000 short of its E bond quota today. Of the \$740,000 quota set in the Victory Loan drive, only \$143,793 had been reported by the committee. Of this amount \$8000 was sold Saturday including \$3000 in bonds purchased by the Jack Dempsey audience at the Marine Barracks that night.

Every \$25 bond purchased also entitles the holder to a chance on the 1946 Dodge in addition to the special events and the opportunity to vote for the favorite queen candidate.
