

Army Romping Away With Gridiron Poll

Sailors, Tide And Indiana Stay Far Behind In That Order

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 (AP)—The Army's 61-0 romp over Penn convinced all the grid writers, except two, that the Cadets are the number one college football team in the nation. The two dissenters of the 83 scribes participating in The Associated Press' weekly poll liked Alabama and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Only once before, when Notre Dame was the unanimous choice two years ago, had an eleven so completely dominated the vot-

ing. Now even the coaching profession is joining the chorus of praise for the uncrowned champions whose only remaining game is their December 1 date with Navy.

Based on 10 points for a first place vote, nine for second and so on down to one for tenth, the Cadets picked up 828 in the voting, an edge of 108 over runner-up Navy.

While Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis were having another touchdown picnic against the Quakers, Navy retained enough backing off an easy win over Wisconsin to hold second place despite strong challenges by Alabama and Indiana.

The Bama Crimson Tide drubbed Vanderbilt, 71-0, but remained in third position ahead of Bo McMillin's "por ill boys" from Indiana as the first four clubs retained their relative positions.

Notre Dame bounced back from the Army debacle to whip Northwestern and advance from seventh to fifth, followed by the Oklahoma Aggies and Ohio State, each of whom moved up two steps to sixth and seventh.

Michigan regained a place in the top 10 off its victory over Purdue, moving into eighth position. St. Mary's tumbled from fifth to ninth on its upset loss to UCLA and Texas advanced from 17th to 10th.

Penn and Holy Cross were dropped from the elite circle because of their respective drubbings by Army to Temple, the Crusaders falling from 10th to 23rd place.

Top Jockeys Will Ride At Bay Meadows

SAN MATEO, Calif., Nov. 20 (AP)—Bay Meadows soon will have some of the nation's leading jockeys on its riding roster.

Track officials announced today Georgia (The Iceman) Woolf, famous stakes rider, and Johnny Adams, three-time American riding champion, will arrive here tomorrow for the remainder of the season, which closes in mid-December. Johnny Longden, another of the nation's top pilots, is scheduled to appear after Thanksgiving.

They will join an already imposing list that includes Hubert Trent, Tony Skoronski, Grant Zufelt, Lester Balaski and Ralph Neves.

Seventeen horses have been nominated for the \$10,000 added six-furlong A. B. Spreckles handicap Thanksgiving Day. The field is headed by Bull Reigh, High Harp, High Resolve and Byemahond.

Yesterday's featured mile race was won by Ever Will with a stretch drive good for a three-length margin over Big Ripple. The winner owned by C. Valois of Roscoe, Calif., and ridden by Gene Pederson of Rowley, Ia., covered the distance in 1:48 and returned \$11.90, \$6.10 and \$5.40. Big Ripple paid \$5.80 and \$4.80, while Vinum, third, paid \$3.70.

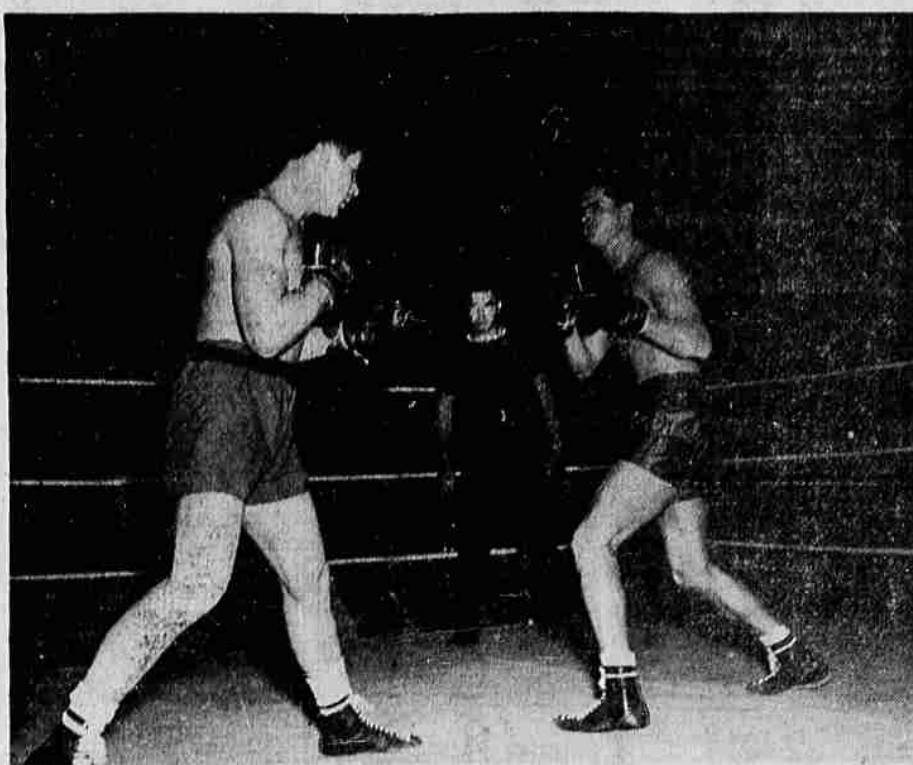

Connecticut Halfback Has Scored 132 Points

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 (AP)—Walter Trojanowski, the University of Connecticut's star halfback, today had the nation's individual football scoring championship virtually sewed up with a total of 132 points.

In his first season since his return from the wars, the 23-year-old former soldier from Bridgeport, Conn., galloped for 22 touchdowns in eight games. A former center and end, Trojanowski finished his season Saturday with a four touchdown spree against Boston university.

Only Army's touchdown twins, Glenn Davis and Felix (Doc) Blanchard have racked up 96 points apiece and have only the Navy contest December 1 in which to make up the 36 points difference. Davis was the nation's top scorer last year with 120 points.

In the Pacific Coast conference, Bill Lippincott, Washington State, and Walter Donovan, Oregon, were tied with 36 points each.

Truman Will Split Loyalty In Service Tilt

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—President Truman will go to Philadelphia Saturday, December 1, to attend the Army-Navy football game.

The White House said the president, Mrs. Truman and their daughter Margaret will travel by train, leaving here Saturday morning and returning to Washington that night.

In accordance with custom, the president will sit on one side of the field—the Army side in this case—during the first half, and on the Navy side during the second half.

Cubs Have Huge Load Of Talent

Pre-War Size Roster Will Be On Deck For Spring Training

CHICAGO, Nov. 20 (AP)—The search for baseball talent, a tough task for major league clubs in wartime, is a simple assignment for the Chicago Cubs this fall.

As of today, there are 47 players on the Cubs' roster. There'll be more—probably another dozen or so—added to that squad of more than five nine-man teams before the National league champions open their spring training season at Catalina island in February.

Indications are that the spacious grounds of the island in the Pacific, to which the Cubs are returning for the first time since 1940, will be swarming with more players than trained at any two major league camps in wartime.

Manager Charlie Grimm, who directed a parade of Cub pitchers to the mound in a couple of world series games against Detroit last October, will be knee-deep in hurlers. There are 21 of them on the roster, including three back from navy service.

Pitching was Grimm's biggest problem last season and it wasn't until the Cubs obtained Hank Borowy from the New York Yankees on July 28 that the club became a pennant contender. Borowy will be back, together with the club's other top winners, Hank Wyse, Claude Passeau and Paul Derringer.

The navy boys on the pitching roster are Vera Olsen, with the club before the war, Russ Meers and Dale Alderson.

Grimm won't have enough catchers to allow each pitcher a private receiver, but there will be at least nine at the training camp, including two not listed on the roster but who will be out of military service shortly.

Twelve infielders are listed and as a starter Grimm has seven outfielders on the rolls. Since the job of signing players to contracts in past seasons hasn't been considered one of the Cubs' worries, it appears that Cholly Jolly Grimm will have lots of company on Catalina next spring.
