

Queen Gets Film Chance

Employment is being handled entirely by the U. S. Employment service. Dent's job primarily is to see that veterans are properly entered into training in approved firms or schools.

The same services are available for disabled veterans under Public Law No. 16. Dent said when vocational disability has been established and in cases of this type his office places the men for training.

How to cook steaks, chops and roasts

Certain basic rules should be followed in the cooking of steaks, chops and roasts to arrive at full flavor and tenderness. The broiling and roasting times listed below will be a quick and easy reference pasted in your scrap book of recipes.

BROILING—DIRECT HEAT

Steaks and chops should be 1-inch thick or thicker for broiling. Place meat 2 to 3 inches from heat. Brown one side of meat, then turn by inserting fork into fat, and brown the other side. About half of broiling time is required for each side, reducing heat to complete cooking after turning and browning. Season meat after broiling or just before serving.

BROILING STEAKS AND CHOPS

Steak 1 1/2 inches thick:
15 minutes—rare
20 minutes—medium
25 minutes—well-done
Lamb chops 1 inch thick
12 - 20 minutes
Lamb chops 2 inches thick.
20 - 30 minutes

Pan-Broiling

Slightly grease heavy frying pan and heat to sizzling-hot. Brown meat well, about 1 minute, on both sides then reduce temperature. Turn meat at intervals and continue cooking until done. Pour off fat, as it accumulates. Do not cover pan. Do not add water.

ROASTING TIMES AND TEMPERATURES

300° F. to 350° F. constant temperature. (Increase roasting time approximately 10 minutes per pound for rolled or boned roasts.)

Beef:
22 to 25 minutes per lb.—rare
28 minutes per lb.—medium
30 to 32 minutes per lb.—well-done
Lamb:
30 to 35 minutes per lb.—medium
35 to 40 minutes per lb.—well-done
Pork:
40 to 45 minutes per lb.—well-done
Veal:
40 to 45 minutes per lb.—well-done
