Additional Fund Sought To Start Work On Malin Park

MALIN — Looking forward to actual construction work on the Malin park in the spring, the park board this week blocked out a program for a drive for additional funds that will get under way immediately after Thanksgiving. Women of the community will be in charge of the drive and it is hoped that an additional \$50,000 can be added to the \$90,000 that has already been subscribed.

Original plans for the park called for an outlay of \$100,000 but with a change in plans that includes the purchase of additional ground, more money will be needed. Total cost of the park, one of the most extensive community programs to be undertaken in Klamath county in recent years, will reach \$135,000, it is expected.

Plans for the community betterment project were advanced two years ago in the Malin chamber of commerce and a park committee was appointed to purchase the ground and to make such progress as could be accomplished during war years. Ten acres of land were bought and recently this has been increased to nearly 30 acres, the new purchase including the hill that lies behind the property where the park will be.

Purchase price of the land owned by W. C. Dalton was \$1000 and it is not expected that this area will be immediately improved. Reason for the purchase was to prevent building on the property that might detract from the park site.

Buildings on the property now owned by the park commission, which includes a garage operated by Conrad Johnson, will be moved. A potato cellar owned by John Robinson, buildings owned by Ben Pickett and by the Malin Cheese company will be moved.

Dick Henzel was re-elected to serve a three-year term on the park board and holdover members are M. M. Stastney whose term expires in 1947, and A. Kalina, whose term ends in 1946. Ted DeMerritt is secretary.

Mexican Held In Rape Case

Charged with statutory rape on a 15-year-old Mexican girl, Felipe Olalde, young Mexican national, is in the county jail awaiting action of a grand jury after a preliminary hearing in justice court Wednesday.

The complaint against him was filed by Nellie Alvarez, sister-in-law of the girl involved.

The offense allegedly occurred last August, and Olalde waived a preliminary hearing October 9. Then he withdrew his waiver on the grounds that he cannot speak English and did not know what was being done at the time of the waiver.

He is in jail in lieu of \$5000 bail.
