

Police Hunt Missing Youth Also Cash

DETROIT, Nov. 24 (AP)—Police investigating the disappearance of Malcolm McLeod, 13-year-old son of a former congressman, were told today no more than \$8000 is missing from the home of McLeod's father.

Clarence J. McLeod, who represented Michigan's 13th district, first said some \$20,000 had disappeared from a closet in his home here. Today he told detectives he found the money, except for about \$8000, in another part of the house.

The former congressman reported the disappearance of his son and of the money yesterday.

Chicago detectives were called into the investigation, local officers said, after a Detroit taxicab driver identified a photograph of young McLeod as that of a boy he drove to the Illinois city Thursday night.

The elder McLeod discounted the possibility his son had gone to Chicago and remained convinced that Malcolm, coming home unexpectedly Thursday night, interrupted thieves who forced him to accompany them.

IAM Suspended

In Washington, the American Federation of Labor has suspended the International Association of Machinists, its largest affiliate, after a disagreement over payment of per capita tax. An AFL spokesman said notices had been sent to member organizations that the IAM had been automatically suspended under a constitutional provision relating to payments delinquent more than three months.

IAM President Harvey W. Brown said the suspension "came as no surprise" to his group's 750,000 members.

Shake-Up Set For French Army

PARIS, Nov. 24 (AP)—President de Gaulle has asked the constituent assembly for a complete reorganization of France's armed forces—a step he repeatedly urged on his superiors without success in his years of service as a French army officer.

French newspapers said today the general's program would permit a thorough shake-up of the country's tradition-ridden army and the introduction of new ideas and methods made necessary by the advent of the atomic bomb.

Prior to France's collapse in 1940, De Gaulle urged greater mechanization of the army. His ideas largely were ignored by his own country but were studied closely by the Germans.

Hungry Chinese Raid Barbecue

CHUNGKING, Nov. 24 (AP)—Twenty Americans are enjoying a barbecue in a U. S. army slaughterhouse tonight when 75 unarmed Chinese soldiers attempted to raid the building in search of meat.

The Americans proceeded calmly with the barbecue; American-employed coolies drove off the attackers, and none was seriously injured in the scuffle.

Pearl Claims Agency Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—The state department plans to ask congress to create a new commission to pass on claims of American citizens for indemnity from Japan for the killing of servicemen relatives and destruction of property at Pearl Harbor, Senator Milliken (R-Colo.) said today.

Claims of citizens for such indemnity can be filed now with the state department, the senator told a reporter. They will be turned over to the commission if it is created.

Milliken explained a movement has been initiated in Denver by a group of leading citizens to secure indemnities on the ground the attack was a criminal and not a legitimate act of war.

Two Killed In Train Smash-Up

ATLANTA, Nov. 24 (AP)—A crowded troop train and a freight train crashed head-on 37 miles northwest of here today, killing at least two persons and injuring an undetermined number.

An ambulance brought two bodies to Rockmart, a town several miles from the scene. Hoke Durham, a Rockmart policeman, said the ambulance driver reported four persons had been removed from the wreckage when he left the scene.

Women Beaten In Dachau Camp

DACHAU, Nov. 24 (AP)—Riva Levy, pretty 29-year-old Lithuanian, testified at the Dachau

concentration camp atrocity trial today that SS guards used iron rods to beat women who were too weak to carry the heavy stones they were required to move.

Another witness, Selman Greenberg, said he was greeted at Dachau with this speech by Johann Kirsch, one of the defendants:

"You filthy Jewish swine must know from now on you eat the bread of Dachau. This means that if you do not do your duty you will go to hell before your time."

Grange Deplores Industry Strife

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 24 (AP)—The national grange, closing its 10-day convention here yesterday, adopted resolutions deploring the nation's "industrial strife," advocating a more equitable milk price, and calling for continued operation of synthetic rubber plants by private enterprise.

The farm organization also approved a 10-point program for economic advancement of the farmer.
