S. navy, of Houston, Texas, in a 2 o'clock service read in Sacred Heart Catholic church Sunday afternoon. The Rev. Father Timothy P. Casey officiated at the double ring ceremony.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, walked down the aisle in a beautiful gown fashioned with a snug bodice, long sleeves edged with lace at the cuffs and a sweeping skirt. The lovely illusion net veil fell from a Juliet cap of seed pearls to a full train. The veil was edged in a wide band of lace. A string of pearls, gift of the groom and an heirloom in his family, was worn by the bride who carried a white prayer book, also a gift of the groom, and a cluster of purple orchids caught with long satin streamers.

Vows were exchanged before an altar banked with white chrysanthemums and palms and lighted by many white candles. Just before the ceremony Carl Hagel sang a wedding hymn and the traditional wedding marches were played by the church organist.

Mrs. Stanley Sinclair, matron of honor for her cousin, wore a water green satin gown with a full overskirt of net. Her flower girls were made into an old fashioned nosegay. The bridesmaids, Mrs. Edward Hanly of Klamath Falls and Mrs. Robert Thomas of Portland, wore similar frocks of lavender satin and net and carried nosegays. The three attendants wore simple little caps of shirred ribbon to match their gowns.

The best man was Edward Hanly and ushers were Captain Stanley Sinclair, Earl Kent and Charles Foster.

Ensign Adams and Mrs. Adams cut their elaborately decorated cake and the confection was later served by Mrs. Howard Dunn of Portland.
