

Loans Taken At Tule On Spud Crops

TULELAKE—H. Karstenson, Yreka, representing the agriculture conservation association for Siskiyou county and Max Green, Alturas, representative of the association in Modoc, were here Wednesday to receive applications for farmer loans on potato crops. Applications must be filed with the offices in both Alturas and Yreka on or before December 15.

Loan value on U. S. No. 1's is \$1.39 per hundredweight and on the No. 2 grade, 47 cents. If the grower does not want to redeem the loan potatoes may be delivered to a commodity credit corporation receiving center at the government support price of \$2.30 per hundred for 1's and \$1.15 on No. 2's, the price to be based on a re-grade at time of delivery.

Five applications for loans had been received Wednesday for each county.

Committeemen who will represent the local communities for the 1946 program will be elected in the near future.

Tule Market Remodeled

TULELAKE—Extensive improvements in the floor plan of Earl's market are under way which will include a new concrete floor and complete rearrangement of the grocery and vegetable departments, the service counter and lunch and soft drinks counter. Karl Gentry, Tulelake contractor, has the contract.

The office, recently moved from the mezzanine to the main floor, will remain in the same location while the fountain will be moved to the part of the store now occupied by the vegetable department. The new horseshoe shaped arrangement will accommodate 45 patrons instead of 22.

The service counters will be placed just behind the fountain across the front of the store and the area now occupied by the counter will be devoted to space for a newly installed frozen food department. Vegetables will go to the rear of the store near the meat department.

The interior will be newly decorated and when completed will be the most modern grocery in northern California. The building was completed in 1940 and is owned by Earl Ager who also operates the business.
