Removal Of Troops From Iran Proposed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—The United States has proposed to the British and Russian governments that the armed forces of all three nations be entirely withdrawn from Iran by January 1.

The proposal was contained in the text of the note which U. S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman delivered to the Russian government in Moscow Saturday. The state department made it public today.

At the same time, this government made plain that regardless

of British and Russian response to the proposal, all American forces would be evacuated from Iran by the first of the year.
