

# Coast Guard Stations Attacked By Armed Jews

JERUSALEM, Nov. 26 (AP)—Police battered with batons and tear gas today into the surrounding Jewish settlement of Shefayim, one of three localities surrounded yesterday after armed Jews wounded 14 officers in attacks on coast guard stations.

Curfew prevailed along a large section of the Palestine coast, where the British were trying to stop illegal immigration. The British sixth airborne division had cordoned off Shefayim, Givath Haim and Rishbon.

Large crowds manned the barricades at Shefayim. Police advised them to disperse and attacked when they refused.

A usually well-informed Jewish informant said 15 settlers of Shefayim were wounded when troops penetrated the village, wielding the butt ends of their rifles. The report was not officially confirmed immediately.

**Attackers Trained**  
A British communique said police and troops trailed attackers of the coast guard stations to the Jewish settlements which were surrounded.

"Action in pursuit of those responsible for the outrages against the coast guard stations continues," the communique added.

Police entered the Givath Haim colony late yesterday afternoon and requested the village leader to arrange a parade for identification. Crowds, armed with sticks, met in the center of the colony and the police withdrew, the British

statement said. A troop cordon was maintained.  
"Attempts were made by the Jews to break the cordon and force their way through," the communique said, "in one case it became necessary to open fire to stop them. One Jew was wounded."

"At Shefayim and Rishbon, similar obstruction was offered by large crowds of Jews who poured into the colonies from the surrounding country. The area was cordoned off by police and British troops."

## Bandit Makes Haul Of \$500

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 26 (AP)—After forcing a waitress to hand over some \$500 from the cash register, a masked bandit escaped last night, while a police officer's gun blasted two shots at his fleeing form.

Detective V. M. Morgan said two policemen entered the crowded snack cafe just after the waitress had forced the bandit to give him the money. The officers ordered him to halt when they saw he was carrying a gun, but the bandit started running and one of the policemen fired twice.

The escaping thief fell after the second shot, but got up and fled down an alley. Morgan said a man was arrested shortly after the robbery, and was held for questioning. The man was not wounded.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 26 (AP)—A "Cowboy and Indians" game brought death last night to a 12-year-old boy when he was shot by a 30-30 caliber rifle his sister had substituted for a wooden gun she had when parents left the home.

Detective Bard Purcell reported Lester Spellman said he turned the gun toward his sister as she romped away from him, then pulled the trigger. The child was shot through the heart.

The father told police he was certain the gun was not loaded when he recently put it in a closet.

Anderson was bound over to the county grand jury.

## Some Crop Payments Set To End

Production payments for three groups of farm commodities now made to Oregon farmers by county AAA committees will be terminated not later than June 30, 1946, reports R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee.

The programs affected are those for whole milk and butterfat, beef cattle and sheep and lambs. The exact termination dates have not been announced, but the chairman reminded that payment rates for butterfat and whole milk have been announced to April 1, 1946.

Word of the termination of these programs was included in an announcement by the office of war mobilization and reconversion that most wartime food subsidies would be withdrawn by June 30, 1946. These subsidies were authorized by congress and initiated to stimulate production and stabilize the cost of living.

**Subsidy Payments**  
In addition to the producer payments, the withdrawal announcement includes subsidy payments to food processors.

Among the processor subsidies which affect Oregon commodities are those on canned and frozen vegetables, to end with the 1945 crop season; cheese, to end not later than February 28, 1946; pork rollback subsidy of \$1.30 per hundredweight, to end not later than March 31, 1946; pork subsidy of 40 cents per hundredweight, to end not later than June 30, 1946; prunes, to

end with the 1945 crop season, and flour, to end not later than June 30, 1946.

The announcement said increases in retail ceiling prices would result on some commodities, while no increase would be made for others. Termination on November 1 of the 5-cent subsidy on butter was offset by a corresponding increase in ceiling price. Washington officials believe that decreases in other food prices will keep total food costs to consumers at or below present levels.

The announcement further said that no determination has been made as to the ending of subsidies on sugar and oilseed, and payments to non-processing slaughterers. The sugar subsidy referred to is the payment to processors. Payments direct to producers, as authorized by the sugar act of 1937, presumably are not affected.

## Gresham Girl Hurt In Bus Accident

GRESHAM, Nov. 26 (AP)—A 10-year-old girl was injured in the knee yesterday when a Gresham-Portland bus left the highway west of here and a fence pole tore through the front of the vehicle.

Sheriff's deputies reported Driver Frank E. Snell, Gresham, said he turned to avoid striking a car that pulled onto the highway in front of the bus, which crashed through the fence. Darlene Baker, Gresham, was the only passenger injured.

## Marsh Seeks Congress Post

McMINNVILLE, Nov. 26 (AP)—Eugene E. Marsh, republican and speaker of the Oregon house of representatives, has announced his candidacy for congress from the first district to succeed the late Rep. James W. Mott.

Marsh, attorney and Legionnaire, stated last night, "I have decided to become a candidate for the position left vacant by the death of James W. Mott, should the governor call a special election to fill that vacancy."

Marsh represented Yamhill county in the Oregon lower house in the 1939, 1941 and 1943 sessions and as speaker in 1945.

He said if the major political parties decided to advance candidates he would submit his can-

didacy to the GOP leadership, but if no organized effort was made he was prepared to qualify as a candidate, as provided by law.
