Butter Still Hard To Get

Butter, that now-you-see-it, now-you-don't commodity, is again on the list of hard to get items in southern Oregon.

The shortage of butter is widespread, although it has been felt particularly in this area. According to Percy Murray of the Klamath Falls Creamery, the local scarcity of this dairy product is due to the fact that dairy products are being neglected for potato harvesting and other crops which are at their peak just now.

A second reason accounting for the shortage is that at present there is an unusually large consumption of market milk.

Relief for butter-hungry America will come around the first of the year when the government plans to release 100,000,000 pounds of butter. In the Klamath area, the situation will be helped near December 1 when the Klamath Falls Creamery will get a carload of butter from Nebraska. Meantime, there will be two more weeks of butter-skimping.

The PX restaurant is finished to the point of interior painting and installation of equipment. This building is located on the upper road, in the center of the barracks area where it will be easily accessible to enlisted men's quarters.

The two-story ward building is framed and plumbing is being installed. This structure is located on the east road in the hospital group, directly across from the dependent's clinic.

Another new building is a 50-man brig. It is located on the Klamath lake side of the heating plant along the Old Fort road, not far from the intersection of the Old Fort road and the new road going to the sewage disposal plant.

A two-story warehouse is completed for use, although

heating has not yet been installed.

The contractor has been making steady progress on this job despite difficulties caused by weather conditions and the lumber strike which has slowed down the supply of materials.

Navy officer in charge of construction at the barracks is Lt. Cmdr. W. N. Hedlin, and Watkins is the civilian engineer.
