## USC Trouncing By UCLA Saturday Will Throw Race Wide Open

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28 (AP)—A decisive UCLA victory over the Southern California Trojans Saturday could throw the Pacific Coast conference in a tremendous turmoil over its own Rose Bowl nominee.

While Southern California and Washington State are the only teams with a mathematical chance of finishing first in the conference race, there's a possibility—in the event of a Trojan debacle—that the league might split in its telegraphic vote Saturday night and pick an also-ran to go to the bowl against Alabama January 1.

# Bad Night Is Prospect For Jones, Mask

In his last two bouts, both with Angelo Martinelli, the Atom Man has ground his cement-like dome covering into his opponent's eyes, half blinding him, and then taking advantage of the period of darkness to get in a killing hold.

# Well, Navy Figures Its Ends Better Than Army's

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 28 (AP)—One position at which navy figures it holds a decided advantage over army is at end, and therein lies navy's chances of penning up swift Glenn Davis.

Dick Duden, six feet tall, 203 pound, 20-years-old, and Leon Bramlett, six feet one, 195, and 21-year-old, will shoulder the responsibility of halting Davis in Saturday's service spectacle in Philadelphia.

Nobody this season has been able to prevent Davis from sweeping wide on touchdown runs, as Army applied its one-two punch, Davis in the open and "Doc" Blanchard down the middle.

But Navy supporters contend that Davis never has run up against wingmen of the caliber of Duden and Bramlett.

Both have been mentioned repeatedly for all-America and Navy coaches consider them the "finest pair" of ends in the country.

They are aptly described today as having spent "less time on the seat of their pants than any other ends in the business."

Duden, a converted back, has developed into what the coaches call an "intuitive type"—he can smell out the plays coming up. "Our scouts tell us that Army

uses 16 variations to get outside the tackles and ends so we will need a nose like Duden's to stop them," Navy coaches said.

Navy, too, will have a "little new stuff," Commander Oscar E. Hagberg, head coach, said after a secret scrimmage, which ended the Middies' heavy preparation for the big game.

The Navy squad comes up to the Army game in its best physical condition of the season, after a light tuning-up today. The Middies will skip Thursday's workout and travel to Philadelphia. A final drill is scheduled for Friday in the Municipal stadium there.

# Army Quarterback Ill In Hospital

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—Harry Adelman, who played a stellar role in Southern California's triumph over Oregon State Saturday, has been named The Associated Press' lineman of the week.

The Trojans had to beat State to stay in the running for the Rose Bowl nomination and Adelman's spectacular job at left end was a prime factor in their 34-7 victory.

With Southern California trailing 8-7, Adelman tackled John Karamanos of Oregon State in the end zone for a safety and two points to put Southern Cal in front. The Trojan later fell on a fumble for a touchdown and broke through the Beaver line several times to throw the ball tolers for heavy losses.

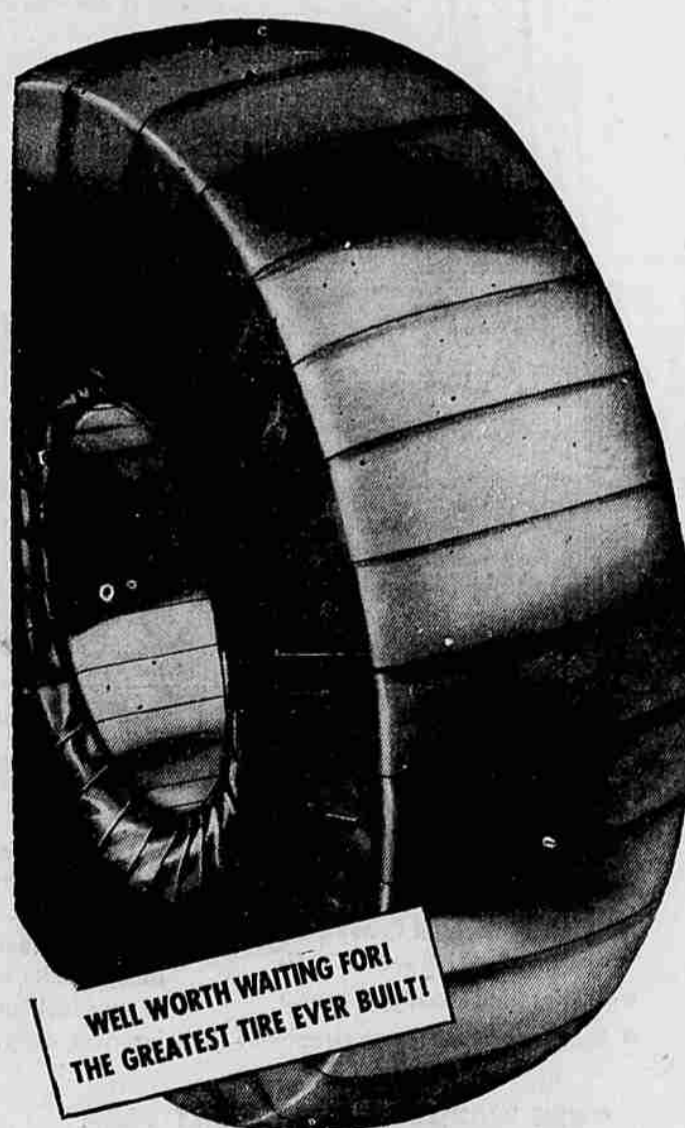
