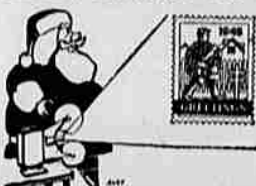

His rifle accounted for eight Japs and silenced one machine gun. Deets is a member of an infantry company of the 96th division. He went into the army in September, 1944, and was sent overseas last February. He was a 1944 graduate of KUHS.
